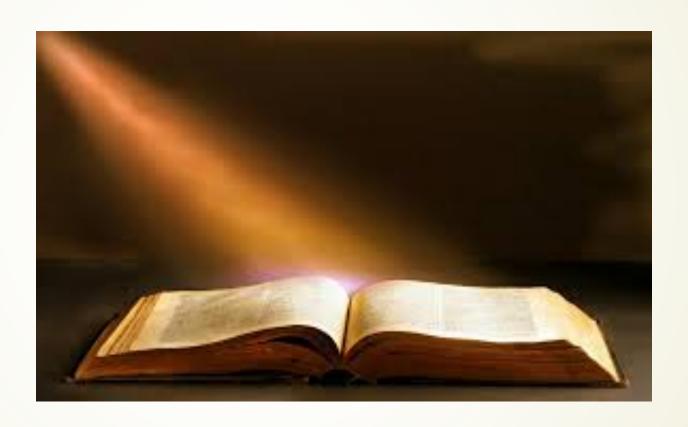

What is meant by "the Bible and Sacred Scripture?"

- Greek word, Bíblía = book;
 Bíble in English
- Latin word, Scripturae = writings, came to be reserved for the inspired writings, Scriptures (in English)

The Bible is not just one book but a collection of many and diverse books, written by different authors over centuries for different audiences.

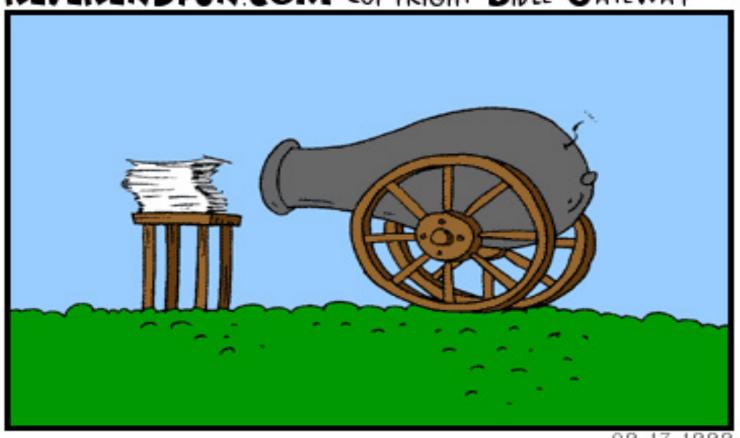
Bíble = 73 books

>46 Old Testament books

>27 New Testament books

Although composed of many books, the Bible, is at the same time, one Book, because it contains one Revelation and has one divine Author.

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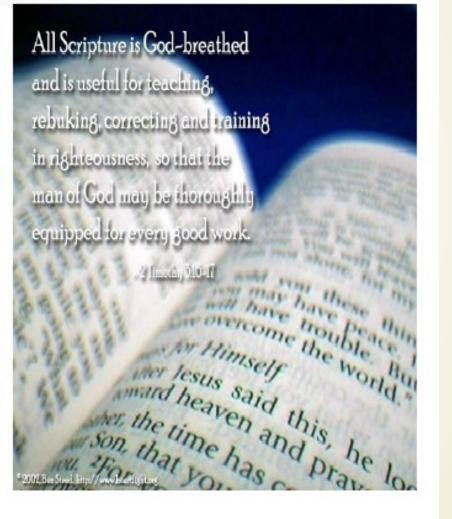

What is the Canon of the Scriptures?

- For Christians the books found in the Old and New Testament comprise the <u>Canon</u> of the Scriptures.
- The word Canon comes from the Greek "kanon" or Hebrew "qaneh" meaning a reed, rule, list or measuring stick. This word (s) was employed by ancient writers to denote a rule or standard.
- Therefore, the Canon of the Scriptures is the <u>authoritative list</u> of books that are acknowledged as "divinely inspired" by the Church, and are set as the standard for Christian teaching, preaching and edification.



Biblical Canon - How to Decide?

- Church followed certain criteria if a writing was worthy to be included in Scripture:
- 1. Apostolic Origins
 - Eyewitness or person close to eye witness
- 2. Universal Acceptance
 - Accepted by the various Christian communities
- 3. Liturgical Use
 - used in early Christian liturgy
 - used for teaching the faith

Criteria for New Testament Canon:

- Orthodox = taught true Christian doctrine
- > Universal used throughout the Christian world
- >Liturgical read out loud in the liturgy of the churches
- Apostolic had to be written by an apostle, or one of the apostle's immediate disciples

The Old Testament The Pentateuch The Historical Books The Wisdom Books The Prophetic Books

The Old Testament = 4 major parts

- Pentateuch (e.g., first 5 books of Bible)
- Historical Books (e.g., conquest from promise land to Maccabean revolt in 2nd century)
 - > Wisdom Literature
 - > Prophets

The Old Testament

- Indispensable part of Sacred Scripture books are divinely inspired
- Figure 12. The economy of the OT was deliberately SO orientated that it should prepare for and declare in prophecy the coming of Christ."
- > Christians venerate the OT as true Word of God

Formation of the Gospels

- 1. The Gospel was handed down in two ways:
 - orally in preaching
 - in writing under the inspiration of the Holy Spirit
- 2. Three stages in the formation of the Gospels:
- (a) the period of the public life and teaching of Jesus
- (b) a period of oral tradition and preaching by the early disciples in 3 key forms:
- (c) the written Gospels themselves

The kerygma or preaching to unbelievers

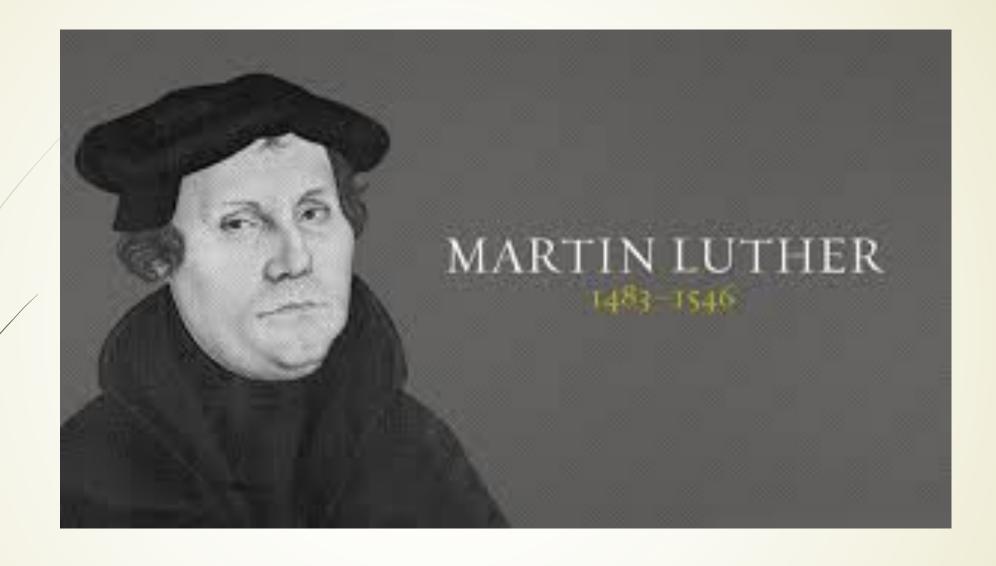
The *Didache* or Catechesis

The *liturgy* or worship of Christians

The Gospels are the heart of all the Scriptures "because they are our principal source for the life and teaching of the Incarnate Word, our Saviour" (CCC 125)



Catholic Bible = 73 Books
Protestant Bible = 66 Books
How did that happen?

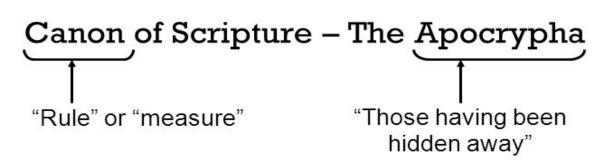


The Reformation

- Catholic: 73 Books
- Protestant: 66 Books
 - * 7 Books were taken out during Martin Luther's Reformation
 - Martin Luther was a former Catholic priest that protested against certain teachings/actions of the Roman Catholic Church; hence, that's how PROTESTants came to be

7 Books Removed

- So what happened? How come the King James Bible only has 66 books? Well, Martin Luther didn't like 7 books of the Old Testament that disagreed with his personal view of theology, so he threw them out of his bible in the 16th Century. His reasoning was that the Jewish Council of Jamnia in 90 AD didn't think they were canonical, so he didn't either.
- Protestants call these 7 books the Apocrypha (Ah-Paw-Kri-Pha), meaning hidden or obscure
 - Tobit
 - Judith
 - Baruch
 - Wisdom
 - Sirach (also called Ecclesiaticus)
 - 4 1 Maccabees
- In addition, certain verses of Daniel (2 chapters and a prayer) and Esther (7 chapters) were removed in Protestant Bible



Why the Protestant church rejects the Apocrypha:

- The writers of the books don't claim themselves to have the same authority as the writers of the Old Testament.
- They weren't widely regarded by Jewish historians. "not... worthy of equal credit" Josephus.
- Not reference by Jesus or other New Testament writers. (There's 295 OT references in the NT.)
- There are factual errors and teaching that is inconsistent with the rest of the Bible.

 Deuterocanonical books: 1 and 2 Maccabees, Judith, Tobit, Baruch, Sirach, and Wisdom mostly written in Greek after 300 BC; also known as the Apocrypha



Inspiration

"All scripture is inspired by God and is useful for teaching, for refutation, for correction, and for training in righteousness, so that one who belongs to God may be competent, equipped for every good work." – 2 Tim 3:16-17

"Inspired" - from the Greek - literally means "God-breathed," a good way to think about Scriptural inspiration

Just as God fashioned Adam out of the earth's clay and blew the breath of life into him (Gen 2:7), God breathes His Spirit into the words of the human authors of Scripture and makes them the Living Word of God.

The first Christians knew that the OT had been inspired by the Holy Spirit:

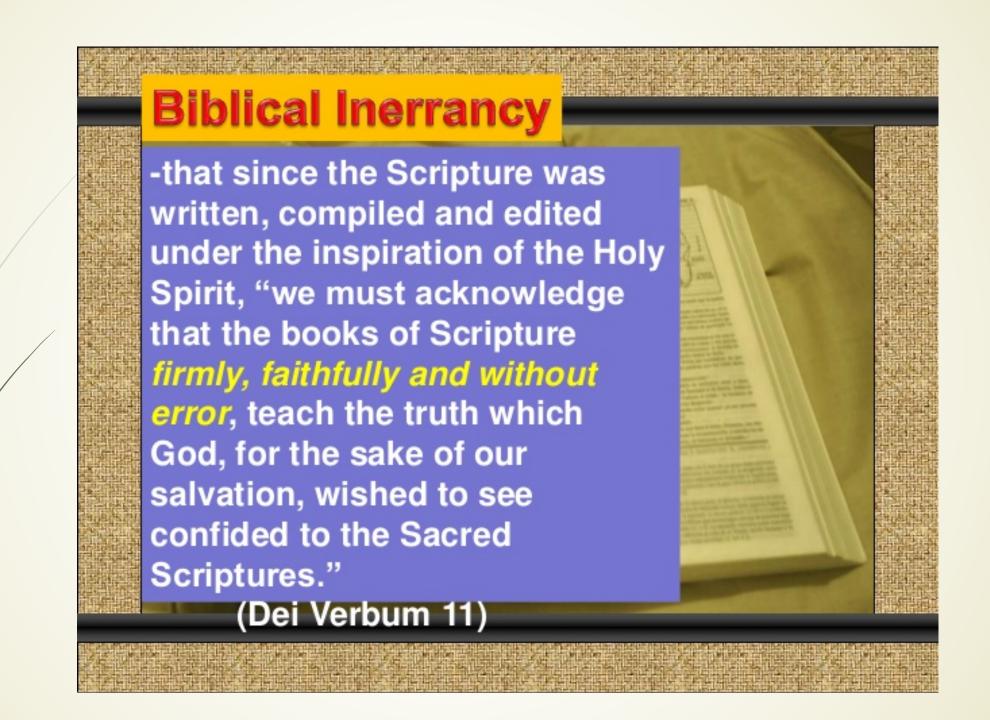
- > Cf. 2 Tim 3:16-17
- >2 Peter 1:21
- Sts. Peter and Paul when quoting OT say, "as the Holy Spirit said..."
- > Jesus also did the same

Inspiration does not mean 'dictation'.

Inspiration is a metaphor for breathing.

God díd not díctate the Sacred Writings word for word, as a businessperson díctates a letter to a secretary.

"To compose the sacred books, God chose certain men who, all the while he employed in this task, made full use of their own faculties and powers so that, though he acted in them and by them, it was as true authors that they consigned to writing whatever he wanted written, and no more" (CCC 106).



Inerrancy does not remove difficulties in the Texts:

"Since I am completely convinced that no text of Scripture contradicts another, if a text of Scripture is brought forward and there be a pretext for saying it contradicts another, I shall admit rather that I do not understand what is recorded' (Justin Martyr)

Inerrancy does not remove difficulties in the Texts:

"I most firmly believe that none of the Biblical authors has erred in writing anything. If I come across anything in those Scriptures which troubles me because it seems contrary t the truth, I will unhesitatingly lay the blame elsewhere; perhaps the manuscript is untrue to the original, or the translator has not rendered the passage faithfully, or perhaps I have not understood it"

(St. Augustine)

Five kinds of difficulties found in the Bible:

- > Textual difficulties (e.g., problems in manuscripts)
 - Literary difficulties (e.g., different times, culture and languages)
 - > Difficulties in reconciling the Bible with other sources (e.g., science)
 - > Difficulties in reconciling certain texts with other texts
 - > Theological difficulties

"In order to discover the sacred authors' intentions, the reader mus take into account the conditions of their time and culture, the literary genres in use at that time, and the modes of feeling, speaking and narrating then current. "For the fact is that truth is differently presented and expressed in the various types of historical writing, in prophetical and poetical texts, and in other forms of literary expression" CCC110.

"... We must note on what occasion the author spoke, to whom he was writing, and why he wrote, lest we miss his real meaning..."

(St. Athanasíus, Oration against the Arians, I, 54).

Are we to take the bible literally? Catholic response: "I take the bible literarily."

Three criteria for interpreting Scripture in accordance with the Spirit who inspired it:

- > Be attentive "to the content and unity of the whole Scripture"
- Read Scripture within "the living Tradition of the whole Church"
- > Be attentive to the analogy of faith

Four Senses of Scripture

Catechism of the Catholic Church, 115-119

Literal

The meaning conveyed by the words of Scripture, interpreted soundly

Allegorical

Symbolic; recognising the significance of events in Christ

Spiritual

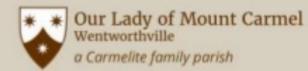
Moral

Scripture leads us to act justly

Anagogical

Viewing realities and events in terms of eternal significance





"The Letter speaks of deeds; Allegory to faith; The Moral how to act; Anagogy our destiny"

(A medieval couplet that summarizes the significance of the four senses, CCC 118).

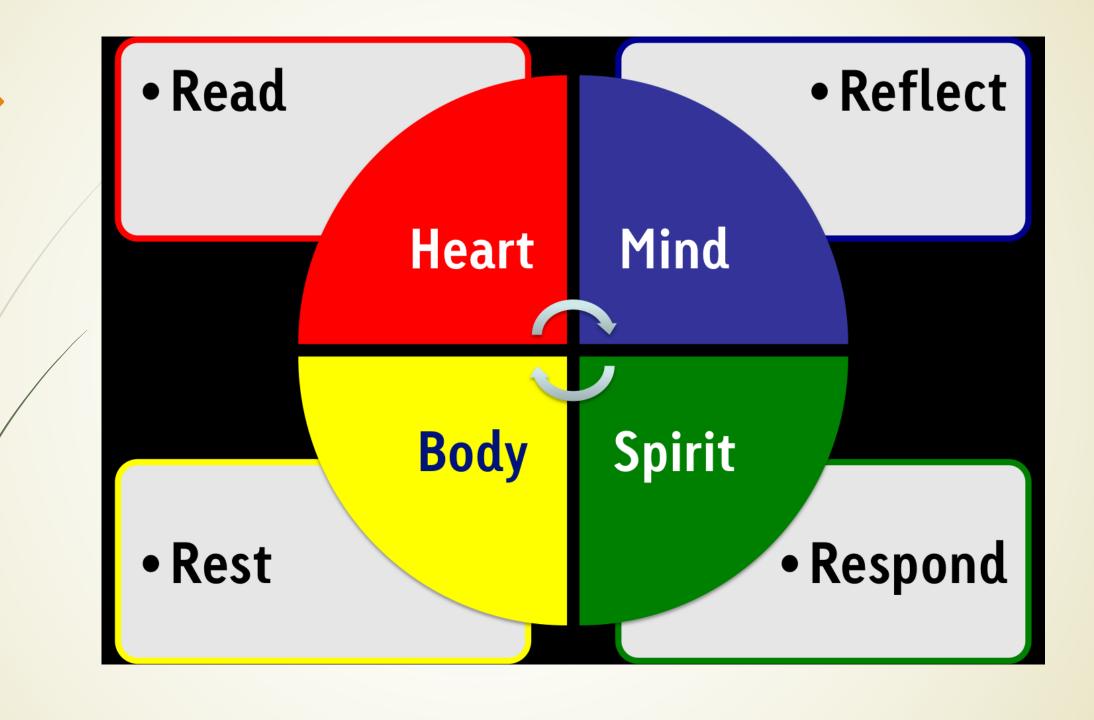
Sacred Scripture in the Life of the Church: "The Bible, an instrument by which God speaks every day to the faithful, thus becomes a stimulus and source of Christian life for all situations and for each person... Through meditation on and knowledge of the Scriptures, one maintains the equilibrium of the soul. Only a profound spirit of prayer and the Holy Spirit's help can introduce us to understanding the Bible. In the interpretation of Sacred Scripture we always need the help of the Holy Spirit" (Benedict XVI, General Audience, 14 Nov. 2007).

Lectio Divina

How to Pray:

- Choose a verse from the Gospel or Epistle to pray
- READ the verse slowly, several times, listening with the "ear of the heart"
- REFLECT on the words, attentive to which word or phrase speaks most to your heart
- RESPOND to the word or phrase that spoke to you, turning it over and over in your heart, offering it up in prayer
- REST in God, sit in silence and listen for how God speaks through that word or phrase





The Four R's of Lectio Divina

Lectio (Reading)

Take your time and read the passage. Get a sense of what it is saying. Read the passage a second time. Listen for any words or phrases that strike you, and listen in your heart.

Meditatio (Reflecting)

Read the passage again, slowly. As you pause on the words or phrases that strike you, take time to consider what the word, phrase, or passage means, particularly in your life.

Oratio (Responding)

Read the passage again, slowly. Consider now how God has spoken to you in this passage and respond back to Him. You may want to consider how this passage is asking you to act differently.

Contemplatio (Remaining)

Now take some time to simply remain in the presence of God.

Key Points:

- > All Scripture tells a single story the story of salvation that culminates in Jesus
- The OT prepares for the New, and the NT fulfills the Old
- > The Church, under the guidance of the Spirit, has discerned which books are included in the list (or canon) of authentic Scriptures (CCC 120)
 - > Bíble = 46 OT + 27 NT

Key Points:

- Food is the author of Sacred Scripture because he inspired its human authors; he acts in them and by means of them. He thus gives assurances that their writings teach without error his saving truth (DV11)
- Interpretation of the inspired Scripture must be attentive above all to what God wans to reveal through the sacred authors for our salvation"
- > The Church has always seen the Scriptures as essential to nourish and govern Christian lives (CCC 131)
