How does a priest keep the confession of a grievous sin by someone he knows from affecting their personal relationship?

One of a priest's most sacred responsibilities is the confidentiality of the confessional. This confidentiality encompasses everyone—even the priest and penitent outside the confessional. A priest is not allowed to discuss the confessed sin with the person outside the confessional unless permission is granted for further counseling.

The confessor is also forbidden to use any knowledge gained through the sacrament of reconciliation to restrict the penitent. For instance, if a pastor's bookkeeper confessed he was embezzling money, the pastor could not use the knowledge acquired in the confessional to fire the person.

Priests generally try to forget the specific sins parishioners confess to us, and it really isn't that difficult. Contrary to what many think, a parishioner's sins do not rush into my mind when I speak to him or her.

We have all sinned, done things we are ashamed of, things we wouldn't want anyone to know about, things we wouldn't want others to define us by. This knowledge and the grace of the sacrament help us look past the mistakes of others and recognize Christ within them.






BRINGING THE GOSPEL INTO YOUR FAMILY:



STEWARDSHIP REFLECTION

Laying Down our Lives: “No one has greater love than this, to lay down one’s life for one’s friends” are the beautiful words we hear from Jesus in the Gospel today. Jesus goes on to say that He no longer calls us servants but His friends. This is the radical truth of our faith. That God became man in order to befriend us and show His love for us through His death on the cross. As stewards we too are called to befriend Christ and lay down our lives for Him.

While the most literal way to lay down our life is to become a martyr for the faith, few are actually called to this type of death. It is more likely that we are called to lay down our lives by sacrificing our own wills and own comforts for the sake of the Kingdom. Pope Emeritus Benedict XVI says, “The world promises you comfort, but you were not made for comfort. You were made for greatness.” This is how we can display love’s greatest act in our lives, to live not for ourselves but to live for the Gospel.

As stewards, we can live for the Gospel by giving our time and talents to our parish community. Our lives are made out of time, so to freely offer our time to help serve those in our community is a beautiful way to lovingly give to others. Likewise, to give of ourselves through the sharing of our talents is another way to lay down our lives for Christ and the Church. Let us strive to commit more faithfully to our call of stewardship.



Summary:

As stewards, we are called to befriend Christ and lay down our lives for Him for there is “no greater love than this.” Since it’s unlikely that we’ll be called to martyrdom, we are instead called to lay down our lives by sacrificing our own wills and own comforts for the sake of the Kingdom. Let us strive to accomplish this through a renewed commitment to stewardship.

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THE CHURCH DEDICATES THE MONTH OF MAY TO THE BLESSED VIRGIN MARY, the Mother of God. We need first to remember that Mary changed the world by her simple “yes.” She agreed to do the will of God. She gave Jesus to the world, and the world has never been the same since. Mary’s example inspires and challenges us to live our Christian faith. Because she consented to be the Mother of God, Mary risked shame, criticism, misunderstanding,

and even false accusations. We know that living a Christian life is not easy. We too risk being ridiculed by a society that supports many forms of immorality. We are called to be courageous and faithful to God and to the Church.

Mary encourages us to be people of prayer. The great prayer of Mary, her Magnificat (Luke 1: 46-55), is a prayer that sings gloriously of God’s presence in her life. As Catholics, we have a particular devotion to the rosary. The rosary is a meditation on New Testament Scripture events in the life of Jesus and Mary, and it uses our basic Catholic prayers as a framework: the Sign of the Cross, the Apostles’ Creed, the Our Father, the Hail Mary, and the Glory Be. It draws the body, mind, and spirit of an individual into an inner place where one can pray even when surrounded by many distractions.

During this month of May, let us open our hearts to the many graces and blessings that Mary, the Mother of God, the first and most loving disciple of Christ wishes to offer us and to seek her protection for all the faithful, from the continuing Covid-19 pandemic.



AN ACT OF SPIRITUAL COMMUNION: My Jesus, I believe that You are present in the Most Holy Sacrament. I love You above all things, and I desire to receive You into my soul. Since I cannot at this moment receive You sacramentally, come at least spiritually into my heart. I embrace You as if You were already there and unite myself wholly to You. Never permit me to be separated from You. Amen.
