24TH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME - SEPTEMBER 11, 2022

Today's gospel gives us three particularly attractive Lukan stories of forgiveness. The first two form a typical Lukan pair. First comes the story of the lost sheep, which comes also in Matthew. Luke, however, puts all the accent on the joy in heaven at the return of the sinner. Then, to the story of the man looking for his sheep, Luke adds the story of a woman looking for her lost coin. He is always careful to show that women have an equal part in the Kingdom with men. So he deliberately pairs Zechariah and Mary, Simeon and Anna, Jairus' daughter raised to life with the Widow of Naim's son, and so on. The main story, however, is the Prodigal Son, told with all Luke's love, artistry and delicacy of character-study: the wastrel son who goes back home simply because he is hungry; the loving father perpetually on the look-out, running to meet the son, interrupting the carefully-prepared speech and pampering the returned wastrel; the disgruntled stay-at-home who invents slanders about the other's 'loose women' and is gently corrected by his father's 'your brother'. An unforgettable picture of the overflowing love and forgiveness of God.

"Si avvicinarono a lui tutti i pubblicani e i peccatori per ascoltarlo. I farisei e gli scribi mormoravano: Costui riceve i peccatori e mangia con loro. Allora egli disse loro questa parabola..." (Lc 15,1-2).

A un uditorio di mormoratori Gesù racconta le tre parabole dei perduti ritrovati. Quale nuova idea di Dio ci rivelano? Tra tutte le parabole sono indubbiamente le più sconvolgenti perché ci insegnano anzitutto che Dio si interessa di ciò che è perduto e che prova grande gioia per il ritrovamento di ciò che è perduto. Inoltre, Dio affronta le critiche per stare dalla parte del perduto: il padre affronta l'ira del figlio maggiore con amore, con pace, senza scusarsi. Gesù affronta le critiche fino a farsi calunniare. critiche che si riproducono continuamente e quasi infallibilmente. Perché tutte le volte che la Chiesa si ripropone l'immagine di Dio che cerca i perduti, nasce il disagio. E ancora, Dio si interessa anche di un solo perduto. Le parabole della pecorella perduta e della donna che fatica tanto per una sola dramma perduta, hanno del paradossale per indicare il mistero di Dio che si interessa anche di uno solo perduto, insignificante, privo di valore, da cui non c'è niente di buono da ricavare. Ciò non significa evidentemente che dobbiamo trascurare i tanti, però è un'immagine iperbolica dell'incomprensibile amore del Signore. Per questo l'etica cristiana arriva a vertici molto esigenti, che non sempre comprendiamo perché non riusciamo a farci un'idea precisa della dignità assoluta dell'uomo in ogni fase e condizione della sua vita (da Perché Gesù parlava in parabole, EDB-EMI 1985, pp. 125ss).

Dear Friends in Christ,

When I came to St. Lawrence Martyr Church, the first thing that struck me was its beauty. The façade of the church is reminiscent of many similar

Romanesque churches that I have been blessed to visit throughout Italy. The space inside the church exudes a prayerful, sacred ambience with our Lord's Presence in the Blessed Sacrament placed prominently in the centre of the sanctuary behind the main altar. Situated near both side altars are the statues of various saints including Mary, Joseph, Lawrence, Francis...just to name a few. Their presence is a quiet reminder of the devotional spirit that resides in the minds and hearts of those who worship here.

It is important to note that devotions are, strictly speaking, not part of liturgical worship. Nevertheless, they have an important role to play in the life of the faithful because they are "expressions of love and fidelity that arise from the intersection of one's own faith, culture and the Gospel of Jesus Christ (cf. USCCB, "Prayers and Devotions"). Catholics throughout the world practice different forms of devotions. These include, for example, the Rosary, the Sacred Heart of Jesus, novenas to various saints, and the veneration of various saintly images. The greatest devotion, however, is to Our Lord in the Blessed Sacrament.

St. Alphonus Liguori once wrote: "Of all devotions, that of adoring Jesus in the Blessed Sacrament is the greatest after the Sacraments, the one dearest to God and the one most helpful to us." As Catholics, we know that one who participates in the sacrifice of the Mass and worthily receives Holy Communion gains countless graces from Jesus. But the Mass is not the only source of Eucharistic grace. After the completion of the Mass, Jesus in His Sacramental Body and Blood remains with us in the Blessed Sacrament. Thus, we do not only make contact with the very well-spring of Grace in the celebration of the Eucharist, but also outside of Mass when we pray before Him, who remains with us as our Friend, just as He promised. That is why Eucharistic adoration is such an important devotion for our spiritual life.

Eucharistic adoration is currently available at our parish in the downstairs chapel from 9:00am until 12:00 noon Mondays to Fridays. It is also takes place every First Fridays from 9:00am to 12:00 noon and from 3:00 pm until 6:50pm in the main church.

In order to facilitate a greater devotion to Our Lord in the Blessed Sacrament, our parish will have all day adoration EVERY FRIDAY starting October 7th. The adoration will take place in the main church immediately after the 8:30am Mass until 6:50pm.

To ensure that someone is always present to accompany Our Lord, I am seeking your help! I need volunteers who are willing to spend an hour with the Lord; individuals who are willing to commit to one of the designated time slots (e.g., 9-10am, 10-11am, etc.) If you are interested in helping out, kindly place your name in the "Adoration Sign-up Binder" that is found in the back of the church. Thank you in advance!

St. Peter Julian Eymard once said, "Adore and visit Jesus, abandoned and forsaken by men in His Sacrament of Love. Man has time for everything except for visits to His Lord and God, Who is waiting and longing for us in the Blessed Sacrament." I pray that you may be willing to set aside a few moments to be with our Eucharist Lord -He who has given His all for us!

Dear Padre

September 11, 2022

My child's godparents make no attempt to build a special relationship with her. I've talked to them about it, but it didn't help. Can I replace them?

When my niece, Hayley, was five, she asked me to be her "step-godfather" because she didn't know who her godfather was. The family friend my sister invited to be Haley's godfather has moved out of state and seems to have forgotten that Haley is his godchild.

Godparents have responsibilities beyond baptism day. The Code of Canon Law says a godparent also "helps the baptized person to lead a Christian life in keeping with baptism and to fulfill faithfully the obligations inherent in it" (872). A godparent should be present for the child's first Communion and encourage the child to live a Christian life as he or she grows older.

While neglectful godparents may not be replaced, parents are not limited to asking only two godparents to help their child grow in the faith. "The whole ecclesial community bears some responsibility for the development and safeguarding of the grace given at baptism" (Catechism of the Catholic Church, 1255). Parents can and should ask others to help support their child's faith development as he or she grows up: a teacher, a grandparent, or a friend in the town where your child has gone away to college. After all, children are baptized into a community of believers, and we all have the responsibility to help children-and one another—lead Christian lives.
