3RD SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME - JANUARY 22ND, 2023



This is the beginning of Jesus' ministry. Matthew first introduces us to Galilee, characteristically quoting the scriptures to show that they are being fulfilled, and in what way. Galilee is called 'Galilee of the gentiles' only in this passage, and it was not a particularly notable feature of Galilee. Archaeology shows that Jewish observance

was strong in the region. Contemporary literature shows that there was a lively tradition of prayerful charismatic rabbis with a warm devotion to the Lord. Jesus begins his ministry by proclaiming the imminence of the Kingdom of God, which will be the subject of all his activity. Then he begins to form the new Israel by calling his team together. The Christian imagination tends to combine this scene with the scene with the Baptist in the Jordan Valley in the gospel of John, which gives at least Peter and Andrew some knowledge of Jesus. But today's narrative must be heard on its own, and the staggering factor is that this is the first time at any rate the sons of Zebedee have set eyes on Jesus. As he passes by he calls them, and such is the electrifying power of his charismatic personality that they simply drop everything and follow this total stranger - immediately, as the evangelist stresses each time.

È tra tutte queste esperienze penose che ci raggiunge la buona parola: non vedete solo le tenebre, guardate anche la luce con cui Dio rischiara la vostra vita. Egli ha mandato Gesù per condividere con voi le vostre pene. Voi potete contare su di lui che è al vostro fianco, luce nell'oscurità.

Non siamo noi che diamo alla nostra vita il suo senso ultimo. È lui. Non è né il nostro lavoro, né il nostro sapere, né il nostro successo. È lui, e la luce che ci distribuisce. Perché il valore della nostra vita non si basa su quello che facciamo, né sulla considerazione o l'influenza che acquistiamo. Essa prende tutto il suo valore perché Dio ci guarda, si volta verso di noi, senza condizioni, e qualsiasi sia il nostro merito. La sua luce penetra nelle nostre tenebre più profonde, anche là dove ci sentiamo radicalmente rimessi in causa, essa penetra nel nostro errore. Possiamo fidarci proprio quando sentiamo i limiti della nostra vita, quando questa ci pesa e il suo senso sembra sfuggirci. Il popolo immenso nelle tenebre ha visto una luce luminosa; una luce è apparsa a coloro che erano nel buio regno della morte!

From the Partor

Dear Friends in Christ, a word that is regularly used in our society today is the word "right." The word is often intended to convey a number of ideas such as: access (e.g., "I have the right to look at public information"), entrance (e.g., "I have the right to go into this place), voice ("I have a right to speak my mind") or priority (e.g., "I have the right to go before you"). Strictly speaking, however, a right is defined as "an abstract idea of that which is due to a person or

governmental body by law or tradition or nature" (Oxford Dictionary). Our Canadian Charter of Rights and Freedoms clearly outlines the types of rights that all Canadians are entitled to including: democratic rights (e.g., right to vote in an election); the right to live and seek employment anywhere in Canada; legal rights such as life, liberty, and personal security; and equality rights for all, just to name a few.

Within our Catholic Church's Code of Canon Law, it should come as no surprise that there also exists an entire section, which highlights the rights and freedoms of all the Christian Faithful. These include, for example: the right to a Catholic education; the right to evangelize nations; the right to receive the Word of God and the Sacraments from one's pastors, etc., (cf. canons 208-231). What is interesting to note is that the "right to marriage" is not found in this section of the Code but is situated among the introductory canons on Marriage.

The canon on the "right to marriage" states that "All persons who are not prohibited by law can contract marriage (c. 1058). Throughout the Church's history, various ecclesiastical documents have defended the fundamental right to contract marriage. Leo XIII in Rerum Novarum (1891), for example, wrote that marriage is a natural right that cannot be in any way denied by human laws. It is a fundamental right of the human person and corresponds to the right of each person to choose their state of life (c. 219).

As it true with all human rights, the right to marry can sometimes be denied, limited, or delayed as a result of various impediments. A person such as myself having been ordained to Holy Orders does not have a right to marriage due to my promise of celibacy. A marriage is prohibited between a parent and child, and likewise between all persons related in any degree in the direct line (e.g., grandparent and grandchild). An indispensable impediment deriving from divine and natural law concerns the unfortunate issue of impotence. A person who does not have the capacity for sexual intercourse (an issue that must be present before the marriage celebration) is prohibited from contracting marriage. A thirteen-year-old adolescent boy cannot contract marriage since the minimum age for men to marry is sixteen years of age. These are just a few examples of the various impediments that might restrict a person's right to marriage.

Given today's complicated and confusing world, where so many people hold a mistaken idea of what truly makes a marriage, the right to marriage can also be denied if the person desiring to contract marriage does not do so according to the mind and heart of the Church's teachings. Pope Benedict XVI made this point very clear, when during his allocution to the Roman Rota in 2011 noted: "The right to marry, ius connubii, must be seen in this perspective. In other words, it is not a subjective claim that pastors must fulfil through a merely formal recognition independent of the effective content of the union. The right to contract marriage presupposes that the person can and intends to celebrate it truly, that is, in the truth of its essence as the Church teaches it. No one can claim the right to a nuptial ceremony. Indeed, the ius connubii refers to the right to celebrate an authentic marriage. The ius connubii would not, therefore, be denied where it was evident that the fundamental requirements for its exercise were lacking, namely, if the required capacity for marriage were patently lacking or the person intended to choose something which was incompatible with the natural reality of marriage." In other words, those who wish to contract marriage that is contrary to what the Lord has taught and which the Church continues to teach cannot exercise their right to marriage.

Finally, it is also important to address another misconception that many people have (both inside and outside the Church) - that somehow the Church impedes the rights of people to marry after a civil divorce. This train of thinking, however, is erroneous since the right of marriage only exits up until the moment that the individual has exchanged his/her consent. The husband/wife ceases to possess the right to marry since he/she is now already married. Once marriage is celebrated, the Church ceases to protect the right to marry, but instead begins to protect the stability and validity of the marriage. A divorced person thus is impeded to contract another marriage because of the prior bond that arose from the previously contracted valid marriage.

The institution of marriage is of divine origin. While the right to marriage is a fundamental right of the human person, our brief reflection shows that exceptions can (and do) arise that limit the exercise of the right for a small group of people.

Dear Padre

Could you explain "lead us not into temptation" from the Lord's Prayer? That doesn't seem like something God would do.

Part of the problem lies in the translation of the Greek verb. Lead is the word used, but it means a request that we not enter into or yield to temptation (Catechism of the Catholic Church, 2846). As we read in the Letter of James, "No one experiencing temptation should say, 'I am being tempted by God'; for God is not subject to temptation to evil, and he himself tempts no one" (James 1:13).

Pope Francis agrees with you that this translation is confusing. He has approved changing this one line of the Lord's Prayer from "lead us not into temptation" to "do not let us fall into temptation." This wording places the focus on us and our activity, as the original Greek implies. It is a plea that we do nothing to put ourselves in the way of temptation or give in to temptation.

This change will appear in the latest edition of the Italian Roman Missal, but there are no plans now to change the wording in English-speaking countries. If you would like to read more about the Lord's Prayer, the Catechism includes an article that goes into a lot of detail (CCC 2777-2865). •
