I SHALL ASK THE FATHER AND HE WILL GIVE YOU ANOTHER ADVOCATE

Only in John is the Spirit whom the Father will send called 'the Advocate' or 'the Paraclete'. Both names have the same derivation and the same meaning, but the formed is from the Latin words, the latter from the Greek. It means someone 'called to one's

side' as a helper, principally as a defender in a lawsuit. The word 'Paraclete' also suggests comfort and strength, as implied in the quality paraclesis or perseverance. In the discourse after the Last Supper, when Jesus is preparing his disciples for their future task, there are four separate sayings about the Paraclete. The Paraclete is sent both by Jesus and by the Father, but always from the Father's side. The Paraclete, the Spirit of truth, will teach the disciples everything and lead them into all truth, witnessing to the Father. The Paraclete is 'another Paraclete', that is, other than Jesus, who will make Jesus present when Jesus is no longer physically with them. The close link and interplay between these three figures gives us not only the beginnings of the theology of the Trinity, but also a lasting confidence that Jesus is never absent from his Church. With the guidance and patronage of the Paraclete the Church enters more and more deeply into the understanding of the divine mystery.

Lavoro e lotta sembrano spesso esigere troppo dall'uomo e superare le sue forze. Egli vede le sue debolezze ed ha voglia di rinunciare, ma quando lavoro e lotta sono le conseguenze dell'amore, conferiscono all'esistenza un respiro profondo, mettono la vita in un contesto più vasto e la rendono importante tanto sulla terra quanto in cielo.

Cose apparentemente infime acquistano un significato quando sono il risultato dell'amore per Dio. Ogni buona azione, anche quella che facciamo senza pensare a Dio, è in relazione all'amore che gli portiamo.

Ogni atto di amore, anche quando sembra minimo - come quando si porge un bicchiere d'acqua a qualcuno che ha sete - assume un significato per l'eternità.

Noi ci chiediamo spesso: che cosa rimarrà del nostro mondo?

È vero che crediamo di poter vivere e risuscitare grazie all'amore di Dio, con tutto ciò che è esistito grazie a questo amore che non si è accontentato di restare sentimento: contatti, relazioni, avvenimenti, cose. Quando risusciteremo, tutto un mondo risusciterà con noi, un mondo fatto di amore responsabile. Sarà magnifico: una "terra nuova", che abbiamo il diritto di chiamare anche un "cielo nuovo".

Dear Friends in Christ, the other day I watched (on YouTube) a commencement speech given by Harrison Butker to the graduating students at the Georgia Institute of Technology. For those of you who are unfamiliar with the man, Butker is a two-time Super Bowl champion kicker, who

plays for the National Football League's Kansas City Chiefs. While he has often been praised for his ability to make many game-winning kicks (including this year's Super Bowl game), what has often been overlooked is how outspoken Butker is about his Catholic faith.

During his speech, Butker offered his young audience some "hard truths" about family, faith and the cancel culture. He told them that despite all the financial successes that they may attain, in the end "none of it will matter if you are alone and devoid of purpose." Butker notes that the world is filled with countless examples of people, who despite having achieved spectacular financial windfalls, nevertheless, remain wholly unfulfilled and unhappy.


Butker gave the graduates a "controversial antidote," which he believes will have a lasting impact for generations to come. He told them to "Get married and start a family." His advice to put family at the center of their lives was based on his own personal experience: "All of this happiness", he noted, "is temporary and the truth is, none of these accomplishments mean anything compared to the happiness I have found in my marriage and in starting a family.... We leave our mark on future generations by the children we bring into the world.... How much greater of a legacy can anyone leave than that?" Butker ended his speech by telling the students that "no matter what happens from here on out, remember your purpose, focus on meaningful relationships, and know that with or without the spotlight, your life has value and you are meant for more" [my emphasis added].

As I reflect upon Butker's message during this Mother's Day weekend, I cannot help but think about my late mother, Theresa, and the lasting impact she had on me and my siblings. My mom was (by most standard) an uneducated woman, since she only had a grade five education. Yet, she left a lasting legacy to us by the way she lived her life.

Mom was a simple woman, who liked to remain in obscurity and out of the limelight. She had a simple faith and a profound trust in God's providence for her family regardless of what difficulties, pains, sufferings, or overwhelming odds our family might have experienced or faced. She would always remind us to "Give everything to God!" – words that continue to resonate with me today and serve as a reminder to "Surrender to God, and he will do everything for you" (Tuesday, Week II, Antiphon 2). My mom's greatest heritage for me was to show what sacrificial love looks like, as evidenced by the countless acts of love that she made for her children, without once asking anything in return from us. It is her example that I try to emulate today, when carrying out my priestly ministries.

My reflection would not, however, be complete if I did not acknowledge the countless mothers within our parish community, and those throughout the world. I know that children often do not thank their mothers for their actions, because they are so accustomed to their selfless acts of love. Allow me to thank you dear mothers! Thank you for being wonderful models of sacrificial love, and for putting your children's needs before your own well-being. I pray that the Lord may continue to bless you with His grace and love, and that He will one day reward you for all your loving actions.

If the Catholic Church recognizes baptisms from other Christian denominations, why not confirmations?

Baptism signs us with an indelible mark. It defines our character and can never be repeated. A baptism is always held to be valid if a person is baptized with water using the Trinitarian formula (Catechism of the Catholic Church, 1256). If a priest is unsure of the validity of a person's baptism, he would baptize the person conditionally, recognizing the earlier baptism if it happened and was valid. The minister of baptism is usually an ordained minister, but in necessity anyone can baptize, including a non-Christian, if the person intends what the Church intends.

Confirmation also leaves an indelible mark, as does holy orders, and they also cannot be repeated. What makes confirmation different from baptism is that the minister of confirmation is ordinarily the bishop because this expresses the apostolic unity of the Church (CCC 1312). If someone had been confirmed in a Church that has apostolic succession, their confirmation would be considered valid, and the person wouldn't be reconfirmed.

Most Christian churches have a common understanding of what the sacrament of baptism is, but while other churches might have communion, confirmation, and ordination, their celebration of those sacraments may not include all the requirements necessary for the Catholic Church to consider them valid. •
