PENTECOST SUNDAY – MAY 28TH, 2023



As THE FATHER SENT ME, SO AM I SENDING YOU: RECEIVE THE HOLY SPIRIT

At first sight this is a surprising gospel reading for Pentecost, but of course the event of Pentecost came too late to be a subject for the gospels, and we read the account of another incident where the

Risen Christ gave the Spirit to his disciples. There are two emphases in the account. The first is peace. Christ brings peace to his disciples with the double greeting of peace, and peace is a Christian watchword. Peace was the song of the angels at Jesus' birth. Each of Paul's letters opens with a greeting of peace. The letter to the Ephesians proclaims that Christ is our peace, the reversal of all worry, strife, envy, jealousy, self-seeking ambition. 'Go in peace' is Jesus' dismissal of those he cures, and also the dismissal at the end of Mass. Peace was Jesus' bequest to his disciples after the Last Supper. The second watchword is forgiveness, for God was always known as a God of mercy and forgiveness, as Jesus came to show by his constant approach to sinners. But the Lord's Prayer shows that if we do not ourselves forgive, we block God's forgiveness of ourselves too.

Nella Chiesa degli apostoli il perdono viene offerto attraverso i sacramenti del battesimo e della riconciliazione e nei gesti della vita cristiana.

Dio ha conferito al suo popolo una grande autorità stabilendo che la salvezza fosse concessa agli uomini per mezzo della Chiesa!

Ma questa autorità, per essere conforme al senso della Pentecoste, deve sempre essere esercitata con misericordia e con gioia, che sono le caratteristiche di Cristo, che ha sofferto ed è risorto, e che esulta eternamente nello Spirito Santo.

PENTECOST SUNDAY - MAY 28TH, 2023



Dear Friends in Christ, every year during the month of May, the priests of the Archdiocese go to the Nottawasaga Inn Resort in Alliston for our annual priestly retreat. The retreat is a wonderful opportunity for us to pray and celebrate Masses together, rekindle fraternity and friendship, and to take some time away from ministry in order to find rest and relaxation. In the past, it was customary for Emeritus Cardinal

Collins to address all the clergy present at the retreat on a number of pertinent topics or issues. This year, Archbishop Leo, continued this practice and offered us a few thoughts that were "close to his heart." While his thoughts were intended to help us live our priestly vocation more intensely and faithfully, nevertheless, I believe that the laity could also benefit from them in living their own respective vocation.

Allow me to elaborate on three thoughts that particularly resonated with me that day. The first point Leo made was that we should always strive to "seek greater intimacy with the Lord." His key point was that priests should continually strive to remain very close to the Master, who called us to be His friends. In other words, priests should try to develop a greater and more profound relationship with the Lord, by spending time with Him in prayer and recollection. And yet, is this only exclusively for priests? Are not all people of faith called to also have a deeper communion with the Lord, who once told his apostles, "No longer do I call you servants, for a servant does not know what his master is doing; but I have called you friends, for all things that I heard from My Father I have made known to you" (Jn. 15:15)? Sadly, many seldom develop any kind of relationship with the Lord, because they rarely offer Him the necessary time and space required to make it possible. Living the faith becomes nothing more than spending one hour in church fulfilling their Sunday obligation! Yet, if every individual only sets aside a few moments each day so that the Lord can be part of his/her life, I am sure that the intimacy that the Archbishop speaks of will not only germinate but flourish in the life of each faithful.

The second thought Archbishop Leo gave was "to be docile to the Holy Spirit." The word docility is defined as "the trait of being agreeably submissive and manageable" — a trait that many priests struggle with given our natural propensity to want to be in control and dictate the rhythm of our ministries. Yet, it is precisely when we step aside and permit the Holy Spirit to take control of the reigns — in essence, when we let him be our Advocate, counsellor, teacher and guide — that we are able to navigate through the ups and downs of our ministries. What I believe is true for priests is also true for the lay faithful. Too often I hear parishioners struggling because they want to control every facets of their life. Nonetheless, the laity can also immensely benefit from being docile to the Holy Spirit, given that the Spirit of God wants nothing more than to help guide each person along the path that leads to true happiness and fulfilment.

His Grace's third thought involves the Blessed Virgin Mary, which should not come as a surprise given that the Marian logo is prominently featured on both his miter and his crozier. He said that "Mary is not the center; but she is central to our life." The Archbishop's simple words contain correct theological truths. While Mary has an important role in God's plan of salvation, it is Jesus Christ, her Son, who is the key to our faith. It is Jesus, through His Incarnation, who reveals the divine mysteries of God and His love for us. Mary, however, is central to our spiritual life because of her close proximity to the Holy Trinity. Mary can teach us how to draw closer to God just as she pondered everything in her heart (cf. Lk. 2:19), when she reflected upon Jesus' words and actions, and memorized them so that she could relive them later. Mary is central to our life because she is perhaps the best way to grow closer to Jesus, or as St. Louis de Montfort simply put it, "To Jesus through Mary."

So much more can be said concerning the Archbishop's three thoughts that he spoke to us priests that day. And while they are important to each of the ordained, his words are also very relevant to the laity. In the end, anyone, regardless of their state of life, who tries to incorporate them into their respective spiritual life will undoubtedly be walking along the right path – one that I believe will lead to the Kingdom of God.



Dear Padre

I am a practicing Catholic and I don't remember being confirmed. Is it too late for me to be confirmed?

The sacrament of confirmation usually happens when a person is older, and therefore you would likely remember the occasion. It could be that you were not confirmed. You can check with the parish you lived in during your school years to be sure. They keep records of confirmations done in the parish.

Confirmation is the final sacrament of initiation. Baptism ushers us into our life with God by giving us new life. Confirmation seals us with the spirit so we can follow Jesus and live out our particular vocation. And the Eucharist gives us strength for the journey and keeps us in union with God.

If you discover you have not been confirmed or if you can't find out for certain, talk with your pastor. You would not be the first adult seeking confirmation. Your pastor can tell you how your diocese handles confirmation for adults. There might be a program of adult instruction for confirmation to ensure you understand the sacrament and the teachings of the Church.

Today is Pentecost, the day when we celebrate the coming of the Holy Spirit into the lives of the apostles. The Spirit gave them strength for what they had to do. The Spirit can do the same for
