#### IF YOUR BROTHER LISTENS TO YOU, YOU HAVE WON BACK YOUR BROTHER

Matthew is a realist. Despite the presence of Christ in the Christian community there are going to be disagreements and misunderstandings in every community and every family. The vital thing is to sort them out and not to let them fester. So here

we are given a safe process. Interestingly, it is the same process as is laid down in the Community Rule of the Dead Sea Scrolls found at Qumran; did Matthew take it from them, or was it widespread at the time? One might complain that it is not very Christian of Matthew to abandon the offending brother or sister to be as a hated tax-collector, even after the failure of attempts at reconciliation. But note that just afterwards, this process of attempted reconciliation is supplemented by Jesus' teaching that we have to forgive not just seven times (the perfect number) but seventy-seven times. That means again and again and again, without limit – even if the attempts at reconciliation have failed.

We also get the reminder that Christ is present always in his community. The same promise is given at beginning (the name Emmanuel means 'God with us') and end of the gospel ('I am with you to the end of time'). Therefore the strength of the community both to reconcile grievances and to make further requests of the Father lies in the presence of Christ within it. It is especially striking that the same promise is here given to the Church as had earlier been given to Peter himself. There is the same assumption as within Judaism, that the Lord is present in the assembled community; in Judaism this is expressed as the presence of the awesome divine presence, the Shekinah; within Christianity it is normally expressed as the presence of the Spirit of Christ.

In questa pagina del Vangelo di Matteo vengono riferiti alcuni "loghia", ossia alcune parole o sentenze, così come furono autenticamente pronunciate da Gesù. Esse sono poste all'interno del discorso elaborato da Matteo sul modo di comportarsi dei cristiani in seno alla comunità. Per comprenderlo, questo discorso deve essere collegato alla frase conclusiva della sezione precedente, in cui si afferma: "Dio non vuole che neppure uno di questi piccoli si perda".

È un monito a chi dirige la comunità, di non escludere nessuno, senza prima aver tentato ogni mezzo per correggerlo dal suo errore o dal suo peccato. Niente, infatti, è più delicato della correzione fraterna. La regola data da Cristo per la vita e la conduzione della comunità è quella di tenere presente la gradualità del procedere. Ognuno deve lasciarsi guidare dalla preoccupazione di salvaguardare, con ogni cura, la dignità della persona del fratello.

Il primato è dato, perciò, alla comunione. Deve essere salvata ad ogni costo, perché la comunione è tale solo se mette in opera ogni tentativo atto a convertire il peccatore.

Se il fratello persiste nell'errore, non sarà il giudizio della comunità in quanto tale a condannarlo, bensì il fatto che lui stesso si autoesclude dall'assemblea dei credenti. Così avviene nella scomunica pronunciata dalla Chiesa; essa non fa altro che constatare una separazione già avvenuta nel cuore e nel comportamento di un cristiano.

Dear Friends in Christ, I hope and pray that you and your loved ones had an enjoyable, safe and blessed summer! As countless students went back to their classrooms this past week to start another academic year, our parish life returns in full earnest and with it my Pastor's Corner.

Last week I took a few days away from ministry. A priest friend of mine and I went and visited California. It was my first time in the western U.S. state - a state wellknown for it cliff-lined beaches, redwood forest, and vast stretches of deserts. We stayed in La Quinta, a charming town approximately two and a half hours away from Los Angles. For those who have never visited La Quinta, the city is filled with many gated communities, with its streets lined with beautiful palm trees, and it is snuggled against the stunning Santa Rosa Mountain.

While Santa Rosa Mountain may be small compared to other California mountain ranges, since it extends for approximately 48km, the mountain is filled with many contrasting sights. Though the mountain's countless sharp, jagged edges conveys a sense of ruggedness, harshness and danger, nevertheless, one cannot help but feel a certain warmth that comes from looking at the mountain's pink-hued colour. From a distance, the mountain looks cold, barren and in-hospitable. Yet, as one drives through the mountain and stop at various vistas and turnouts, it is apparent that the mountain is filled with life, especially as its entire landscape is dotted with numerous shrubland plant community, and various flora and fauna. As I reflect upon my brief mountain experience, what I quickly came to realized was how easy it is for one to see only the obvious, but to overlook the hidden and not so obvious.

In many ways, I believe that people make this same mistake in their life. Too often our mind, thoughts and eyes are focused on those pressing things in our life. In the world, for example, the media tends to continually present to us the not so pleasant realities of life, such as war, famine, hostility, division, strife, etc. On an individual level, we tend to be predominantly preoccupied with the pain, suffering, challenges, difficulties, trials and tribulations that either impact us personally, or someone we know or love. Yet, as we walk through "the valley of tears" somewhat overwhelmed and profoundly affected by negative and painful thoughts, emotions and feelings, it can be easy to become discouraged and overlook the goodness, kindness and love that emanates from God. The challenge for each of us during these trying times is to not only see the obvious but train our eyes to search for the less obvious. This includes to recognize, or strive to see that the Lord is in the midst of our sufferings; that He continues to walk with us and sustain us by His love and grace. Hidden in the messiness of our daily life is the beauty, warmth and love of God, and the certain comforting knowledge that He has not abandoned any of us in our hour or time of need.

The Lord is very much always walking with us even when we do not recognize His Presence. The words of the "Footprints in the Sand" wonderfully reminds us of this reality when it states: "One night I dreamed I was walking along the beach with the Lord. Many scenes from my life flashed across the sky. In each scene I noticed footprints in the sand. Sometimes there were two sets of footprints, other times there was one only. This bothered me because I noticed that during the low periods of my life, when I was suffering from anguish, sorrow or defeat, I could see only one set of footprints, so I said to the Lord, 'You promised me Lord, that if I followed you, you would walk with me always. But I have noticed that during the most trying periods of my life there has only been one set of footprints in the sand. Why, when I needed you most, have you not been there for me?' The Lord replied, 'The years when you have seen only one set of footprints, my child, is when I carried you.'"

Whatever is our state in life, let us never be discouraged or downcast. Instead, let us always seek the Lord even when He does not appear conspicuously present to us. With the words of the psalmist, we can cry out to Him by saying, "Save me, O God, by your name, and vindicate me by your might. Hear my prayer, O God; give ear to the words of my mouth. But surely, God is my helper; the Lord is the upholder of my life." (Psalm 54).

#### September 10, 2023

Recently our new pastor relocated the rectory away from the church and parish office. Why is this becoming more common?

"The laborer deserves his payment" from Luke 10:7 has been traditionally interpreted to suggest that ministers for the Lord engaged in pastoral service are provided with certain basic necessities, such as a place to call home. Some priests are now choosing a distinct location in which to live that is apart from where their ministry is primarily conducted. A reason for this move is often attributed to rectories that have no clear boundaries between the private living space and the parish office.

While clergy in apostolic ministry are not necessarily seeking a cloistered existence, they do deserve the fundamental privacies enjoyed by everyone else. Sometimes this courtesy is not respected by those who have an unhealthy curiosity about the lives of their parish priests or by those who are preoccupied with being "in the know" (and sharing what they know with the rest of the congregation).

Dedicated priests can be accessible and available at various hours during the day or night without having to live in a fishbowl. Sometimes this may warrant a new rectory location or facility, especially if the pastor in stocking feet on his day off can't pour his morning coffee without stumbling into a DRE staff meeting!
