Matthew 22:15-21

GIVE BACK TO CEASAR WHAT BELONGS TO CEASAR

They must really have thought they had their victim sewn up! If Jesus said he paid the Roman taxes, he recognised the Emperor, not God, as his Lord. If he said he didn't pay, he was a traitor to Rome. Jesus turns the question back on them. First he makes them

admit that they themselves recognise Rome as overlord by carrying a Roman coin, for the coin would carry the Emperor's head. Next he puts them a question: what do they consider is due to Caesar? Finally he goes beyond their question, to interrogate their ultimate loyalty: in the last analysis, just what is due to God? At a superficial level this seems a little verbal tussle, in which Jesus outwits his opponents. But the story was remembered and passed on in the Christian community not because of Jesus' cleverness, but because at a deeper level it is a question which Jesus puts to each of us: just where do our loyalties and priorities lie? Money? Respect? Fame? A good holiday? Comfort? Power? Jesus is not a dictator who imposes his will. He just asks the question and leave us to give our own answer. To those who question him he gives no easy answer, but always replies with another question.

L'ipocrisia dei farisei e dei sadducei proclama la veridicità di Gesù, che essi cercano di cogliere nella rete di un dilemma sapientemente calcolato: o egli afferma che il tributo ad uno Stato straniero e idolatra è lecito, e perde la stima di coloro che non accettano il dominio romano; oppure dichiara che questo tributo è illecito, e apre la porta al suo processo con l'accusa di istigare la sedizione. "Rendete dunque a Cesare quello che è di Cesare". Gesù non è il capo di un movimento di rivolta: il suo discepolo deve compiere i suoi obblighi civici. È in questo modo che l'ha capito la prima Chiesa (Rm 13,1-7; 1Pt 2,13-17). Ma ciò che è importante e decisivo, e che non sembra preoccupare i farisei, è il seguito: "E a Dio quello che è di Dio". Soltanto a Dio si devono l'adorazione e il culto, e né lo Stato né alcun'altra realtà di questo mondo possono pretendere ciò che è dovuto esclusivamente a Dio. Il martirio è l'espressione suprema della resistenza cristiana di fronte al tentativo assolutistico del potere temporale di usurpare il posto di Dio (Ap 20,4).

A Dio ciò che è di Dio! Ma tutto appartiene a Dio, che è il creatore. Ed è per questo che non si può astrarre Dio durante la costruzione della città terrena, "quasi che Dio non meriti alcun interesse nell'ambito del disegno operativo ed associativo dell'uomo" (Reconciliatio et paenitentia , 14). L'uomo può realizzare la pretesa blasfema di costruire un mondo senza Dio, ma "questo mondo finirà per ritorcersi contro l'uomo" (ivi , 18).

Pastor's Corner

Dear Friends in Christ, last week I gave a baptismal preparation class for a young couple, who wanted to have their new baby girl baptized in the Roman Catholic Church. The responsibility for formation, that is, instructing parents and their sponsors regarding the meaning and obligations of

baptism, usually falls on the pastor/priests of the parish. The Code of Canon Law makes this explicitly clear when it states: "Pastors of souls and other members of the Christian faithful, according to their respective ecclesiastical function, have the duty to take care that those who seek the sacraments are prepared to receive them by proper evangelization and catechetical instruction, attentive to the norms issued by competent authority" (cf. Canon 843 §2).

I began my class that evening by reminding them why the sacrament of baptism is such a critical part of our spiritual life. Too often, the child's parents and family members only see the celebration of baptism through the prism of a secular mindset; that is, baptism gives the parents and other family members an opportunity to come together, with the planned luncheon/dinner party being more important that the actual celebration of the baptism itself.

Yet baptism is more than that! Baptism is "the Sacrament by which human beings are incorporated into the Church and are built up together into a dwelling place of God in the Spirit; it is also a sacramental bond of unity linking all who are signed by it" (cf. The Order of Baptism of Children). Not only is baptism needed for salvation by actual reception or at least by desire, it is also the gateway to the other sacraments - the various means by which every faithful is able to experience, encounter the Lord in a personal, intimate way, and to receive His countless graces during the various stages of his/her life!

In the opening dialogue with parents and godparents during the rite of baptism, the celebrant asks the parents of the child, "What do you ask of God's Church for your child?" After the parents replies by saying, "Baptism", the celebrant addresses the parents in the following words, "In asking for Baptism for your child, you are undertaking the responsibility of raising him (her) in the faith, so that, keeping God's commandments, he (she) may love the Lord in his (her) neighbour as Christ has taught us. Do you understand this responsibility?" This simple query is a powerful reminder to Catholic parents that they have the primary responsibility for caring and cultivating the newly God-given seed of faith. It is their duty to ensure that their infant child is raised up in the Catholic faith.

Parents, however, do not have to carry out this duty alone since they also receive assistance from various other sources. Those individuals, who have been chosen for the role of godparents, play a key role in helping parents carry out their duty. The People of God - as represented by relatives, friends, acquaintances, neighbours, and members of the local church - can take an active part by showing their common faith by their prayers, support, and faithful witness to the Gospel.

At the conclusion of the baptismal class, I reminded the parents on their need and responsibility to bring their baby to church every Sunday, since the Lord wants to encounter each person regardless of what his/her stage in life. Sadly, the parents expressed a reluctance to come to church each Sunday because of the frosty, unfriendly reception, which they often receive from various members of the parish community, particularly when their child is crying, cranky, etc., during Mass. Unfortunately, their response has become all too familiar, since many other parents have spoken in a similar manner.

A church filled with the harmonization, or lack-thereof, of crying children and babies is a beautiful church. Their sound is a powerful reminder that the vibrancy of life resides within a parish community. Let us not try to dissuade parents from bringing their babies and children to the Lord; nor should we try prevent the little ones from assuming their rightful place among us. Our Gospel powerfully reminds us what happened to the disciples, when they tried to prevent people from bringing little children to Jesus for him to place his hands on them. The Lord rebuked them! And, Jesus told his disciples (and, each one of us): "Let the little children come to me, and do not hinder them, for the kingdom of heaven belongs to such as these" (cf. Mt. 10:13-14). 

Dear Padre

Is it a sin to break the law? It is illegal to use fireworks in my city, but every year I do it anyway. Should I mention this in confession?

Strictly speaking, to break a government law does not automatically constitute the definition of sin, so it needn't be mentioned in the sacrament of penance. By definition, sin damages (or, with grave sin, destroys) communion with God and the Church (Catechism of the Catholic Church, 1472). Some actions may not be objectively destructive to our relationship with God and Church-and therefore are not sinful—but they may affect others. Church members are part of society, which depends on its citizens to abide by the laws. Saint Paul encouraged everyone to obey the authorities, for all authority that exists is established by God (see Romans 13:1-7).

Not all sins are equally offensive to God; similarly, not all civil laws are equal in their gravity. To knowingly travel a few miles over the posted speed limit isn't the same as intentionally starting a fire in a posted area of a forest. The danger is in thinking one's actions are without consequence. Sensible civil laws are designed to ensure the safety and well-being of citizens, and many municipalities outlaw fireworks because of the hazards they pose.

When any civil law is broken for mere self-indulgence or when breaking the law places others at risk, the act has the potential of constituting the definition of sin. In that case, it would rightfully warrant sacramental reconciliation.
