Matthew 23:1-12



THEY DO NOT PRACTISE WHAT THEY PREACH

This chapter contains the fiercest of all the hard things which the gospel of Matthew has to say about the scribes and Pharisees. It introduces a sevenfold curse upon them. The Pharisees were the party of the Jews most concerned for the exact observance of the

prescriptions of the Law of Moses. The 'scribes' were lawyers to whom they would turn in the case of a clash between two laws. It is good to follow laws and good to be able to work out what the laws are telling you to do, but their attention to detail and their fussiness often made them lose sight of the real purpose of the Law.

However, Jesus was prepared to meet the Pharisees on their own ground and debate with them in their own terms. The Pharisees took no part in the condemnation and death of Jesus; they are simply not there in the narrative. His opponents in Jerusalem were the Sadducees, who were in charge of Jerusalem.

Argument about legal observance is part of the Jewish way of life, even today, and the controversies in the story of Jesus could well have been inhouse discussions about the interpretation of the Law, rather than hostile confrontations. He even used – and used brilliantly – the Pharisaic method of quoting the Law in argument, setting text against text, and the recognized rules of interpretation. He uses this technique to put the Law of love of neighbour on the very same level as love of God.

In the gospels, and especially in Matthew, written towards the end of the century, the hostility to this group has obviously become fiercer, no doubt because of their persecution of the followers of Jesus. As Matthew warns, 'they will flog you in their synagogues.' One of their concerns was obviously the status of the religious leaders. It looks as though they were turning into little gods on their own. This was a danger in Judaism, where specialized interpreters of the Law were required and honoured; there were many rabbis ('my great one') in Israel.

Quello che dovrebbe essere il comportamento del vero cristiano appare nell'insegnamento di san Paolo ai Tessalonicesi. Chiamato da Cristo sulla via di Damasco, san Paolo scoprì, per un'improvvisa folgorazione, tutto il mistero di Cristo e capì che l'essere Cristiano. consiste nello spirito di apostolato. Egli stesso, pieno dello Spirito di Cristo risorto, lo trasmise agli altri.

Essere cristiani vuol dire questo: non tanto rispettare ciecamente delle formule o dei precetti, ma donare Cristo agli altri, mediante una vita cristiana onesta, perché, grazie all'apostolato della preghiera, della sofferenza e delle opere, il cristiano possa divenire una forza vivente del Vangelo di Cristo.

Questo è l'insegnamento di Gesù ed è così che deve vivere chi vuole essere cristiano.



St. Teresa of Avila



"To have courage for | whatever comes in | life ~ everything lies | in that."

Born in Spain in 1515, St. Teresa of Avila grew up reading and studying about Christian martyrs. Their examples inspired her, to the point where she longed to die a martyr's death. But she would face other tests that would require courage, including illnesses and the death of her family. She stayed courageous to complete God's tasks for her throughout her life.

It's impossible to know what a day may bring. God has plans for us, but sometimes those plans take us through difficult times. You must remember to stay courageous, even when the going gets tough.

Pastor's Corner Dear Friends in Christ, a few days ago I received an email from Joanne, the daughter of a former parishioner of mine, who notified me that her mother, Jane, had succumbed to cancer. The news of Jane's death was not totally

unexpected given that her cancer had gotten progressively worse over the years, and had reached a point where the doctors couldn't do anything more for her. With great peace in her heart, Jane awaited her journey home to the Father's house.

Jane was an incredible woman of faith. Although she faced the same fear and uncertainty that many people who have been diagnosed with cancer experience, nevertheless, Jane continued to find strength to patiently embrace her cross. Jane's reservoir of strength came from two sources. The first came in the form of a counsel, which originated from my late mother, Theresa, that I had shared with Jane a few years ago. Prior to dying of pancreatic cancer, my mom said to me: "Thomas, in the future when you become a priest, whenever you are confronted with any kind of pain, sufferings, trials and/or tribulations, go to the foot of the Cross and hang on to the feet of Christ. It is there where you will find all the strength and grace that you need." Jane told me that my mother's words profoundly impacted her and resonated within the depths of her heart, and that over the years they helped her to patiently embrace her cross and to accept with holy resignation God's will for her life.

Secondly, and more importantly, Jane received strength and grace through Our Lord, who always shows a great concern for both the bodily and spiritual welfare of the sick. The Gospel is filled with countless stories of Jesus providing healing to those afflicted with various kinds of ailments, diseases, and sicknesses. The Lord gave his healing power to his apostles and disciples; and he gave the same power to his Church by instituting the sacrament of anointing as the Letter of James clearly reveals: "Are there any who are sick among you? Let them send for the priests of the Church, and let the priests pray over them, anointing them with oil in the name of the Lord; and the prayer of the faith will save the sick persons, and the Lord will raise them up; and if they have committed any sins, their sins will be forgiven them" (James 5:14-16).

The sacrament of anointing is celebrated through the laying on of hands by the priests of the Church, the offering of the prayer of faith, and the anointing of the sick with oil made holy by God's blessings. The rite signifies the grace of the sacrament and confers it. For those who receive the sacrament through the hands of the priest, the sacrament gives the anointed person "the grace of the Holy Spirit to those who are sick: by this grace the whole person is helped and saved, sustained by trust in God, and strengthened against the temptations of the Evil One and against anxiety over death. Thus the sick person is able not only to bear suffering bravely, but also to fight against it... If necessary, the sacrament also provides the sick person with the forgiveness of sins and the completion of Christian penance" (cf. The General Instruction of the Pastoral Care of the Sick). Jane experienced God's strength and grace each time she received the oil of the infirm during the sacrament of anointing.

Despite the great blessings that the sacrament of anointing bestows upon an ill person, sadly many of the faithful follow the wrongful practice of delaying it reception. Even worse are the unfortunate few, who see the anointing as some form of "kiss of death". These individuals mistakenly believe that by asking a priest to minister the sacrament, he will somehow cause the person's condition to worsen, or result in unnecessary anxiety or fear being brought to the individual and/or his/her family. Unfortunately, far too many Catholics needlessly have to endure their illness, suffering and crosses alone; without the strength and consolation that the Lord wishes to offer them through the sacrament of anointing.

Joanne informed me that in her final days as Jane remained in palliative care, she had a profound longing to be with the Lord. Her desire was quickly granted since she shortly died peacefully thereafter. Although Jane ultimately died surrounded by her three daughters in the nursing home, it should be noted that she also died in the bosom of Holy Mother Church, since she was given the privilege of encountering the Lord one last time before her death, when the priest administered Last Rites and gave to her Jesus, one final time, in the holy Viaticum. "Give thanks to the LORD, for he is good. His love endures forever" (Ps 136:1).

I would like to do more spiritual reading, but everything I've tried is either over my head or too sweet and pious for me. Do you have suggestions for any downto-earth authors?

You might try reading shorter works. More is not necessarily better. Consider several publications available at Liguori.org. In My Own Words is a series of books that gathers excerpts from different authors: Dorothy Day, Sr. Thea Bowman, Pope St. John Paul II, and others. Also consider the Wisdom series for Advent and Christmas or Lent and Easter. These include the writings of ancients and a few more current authors like Pope Francis, Henri Nouwen, and Thomas Merton. Daybreaks for Advent and Lent are booklets of short meditations for each day of each season. Catholic Update, a four-page newsletter from Liguori, features in-depth articles on contemporary topics written by expert authors.

C. S. Lewis was a prolific and popular Christian author. His Mere Christianity is practical and informative. A Grief Observed is a beautiful meditation for those who have lost someone dear to them, as is Henri Nouwen's In Memoriam. Merton's New Seeds of Contemplation has inspired readers since it was first published in 1949.

Finally, the best place to start might be the Gospel of Mark-not to study or analyze. Rather, read it just to get to know Jesus a little better.
