3RD SUNDAY OF ADVENT – DECEMBER 17TH, 2023

John 1:6-8,19-28



"THERE STANDS AMONG YOU THE ONE COMING AFTER ME"

So, John the Baptist came as a witness to the light. In today's gospel reading he seems rather to refuse witness. He is guite negative, answering with a stalwart and repeated 'No!'. He witnesses only 'There is one standing among you whom you do

not know'. It is not always easy to find Jesus. All the way through the Gospel of John there are misunderstandings about Jesus, as people fail to recognise him for what he is: the Samaritan at the well, Nicodemus, Mary Magdalen beside the empty tomb, even Peter and the disciples as they fish on the Lake. We can easily become so wrapped up in our own troubles and worries that we fail to recognise the one figure who can bring their solution, although he is standing among us, the one who 'has the words of eternal life'. He may come to us in a way we do not like, as a corrective, blocking or diverting the way we had chosen. He may come as suffering, disappointment, failure or bereavement. All of these may be acts of God's love, to show us the way, though we cannot see it at the time. It is just like John the Baptist, saying steadily 'No!', until eventually we turn around and see Christ as our true light.

No, rispose Giovanni Battista: "lo sono voce di uno che grida nel deserto: Preparate la via del Signore, come disse il profeta Isaia" (Gv 1.23).

Sant'Agostino commenta: "Giovanni Battista era una voce, ma in principio il Signore era il Verbo. Giovanni fu una voce per un certo tempo, ma Cristo, che in principio era il Verbo, è il Verbo per l'eternità" (Serm 293)

" Egli - dice l'evangelista Giovanni - venne come testimone per rendere testimonianza alla luce, perché tutti credessero per mezzo di lui". Vi sentiamo un'eco del prologo: "Veniva nel mondo la luce vera, quella che illumina ogni uomo" (Gv 1,9).

Anche noi dobbiamo essere suoi testimoni (Gv 15,27) e ciò, prima di tutto, nella santità delle nostre vite perché "mi ha rivestito delle vesti di salvezza, mi ha avvolto con il manto della giustizia" (Is 61,10).

3RD SUNDAY OF ADVENT – DECEMBER 17TH, 2023



Dear Friends in Christ, this past Monday while I was attending to some personal errands on my day off, I happened to drive to a Tim Horton's in Etobicoke for a

cup of coffee. As I was entering the drive-thru lane, I passed a young woman (approximately in her late 20's), who was standing on the sidewalk holding a sign with the words, "I am homeless and will accept any kind of help." At first glance, neither the young woman's appearance nor the contents of her sign really made a significant impact on me. Nevertheless, I was quickly awakened from my "slumber" shortly thereafter, when I noticed the sight of a dozen or so tents - of varying sizes and colours - all pitched on a small patch of grass some two hundred metres away.

The lack of available, affordable, and adequate housing, the rising inflationary pressures, and the increased cost of living, etc., has pushed many Canadians into a social and economic crisis. This makeshift "tent city" situated near Dundas St. and 427 captures in a small way the harsh realities that many struggling people face today. Given that the woman was begging in close proximity to these pitched tents, it was very likely that she was in fact homeless and living out in the cold.

As I reflected upon my experience later that day, I could not help but ask myself a number of questions. Why wasn't I initially moved, when I first saw the young woman standing shivering in the cold with her sign in hand? Have I grown so accustomed to seeing people like her that I have become so desensitized to the painful realities of their situation? Have I become so complacent with living my own reality that I have become incapable of empathizing with the less fortunate, the homeless, etc....? Have I become so self-preoccupied that I have been unable to see those in need?

The season of Advent and Christmas is supposed to a joyous time, as we prepare for the arrival of the birth of Christ. Yet there is an inherent danger lurking close to us, given that we can become so preoccupied with our own "things" that we become indifferent, insensitive and unresponsive to the painful realities that others are unfortunately experiencing. So, the challenge for us during this period is to try to prepare for Christ in a faithful manner, while also being vigilant and on the lookout for those who may need our help, warmth, love, etc. St. Clare of Assisi once remarked: "We become what we love and who we love shapes what we become. If we love things, we become a thing. If we love nothing, we become nothing. Imitation is not a literal mimicking of Christ, rather it means becoming the image of the beloved, an image disclosed through transformation. This means we are to become vessels of God's compassionate love for others." While the possibilities are endless on how we can help the less fortunate during the Christmas season, the key is to make an effort to make a difference in someone's life.

As I ordered my coffee that morning, I decided to buy an extra meal and a cup of coffee for that young woman. When I approached her, I asked her if she was hunger? Unsurprisingly, she said, "Yes!" As I gave her the meal, along with an extra few dollars, she flashed a small smile across her weather-beaten face and wished me a "Merry Christmas!" Her smile was a blessing for me, for through it I was reminded of Our Lord's words, "Truly I tell you, just as you did it to one of the least of these who are members of my family, you did it to me" (Mt. 25:40). 
Was Jesus born in a stable or a cave? The Christmas scene in our church has Jesus born in a little shed, but in my friend's church it looks more like a cave. The Bible says Jesus was born in a manger, so just where was Jesus born?

The Christmas scenes, sometimes called Nativity scenes or crèches, vary from church to church. In Scripture, we find more details about the Nativity in Luke's Gospel, but even he simply says that Mary wrapped Jesus in swaddling clothes and laid him in a manger because the inn was full (Luke 2:7).

In none of the Scriptures do we have any details about what the place looked like, but since a manger is a place where caregivers feed livestock, we can assume that Jesus was born in a stable of some kind. At that time, small caves sometimes were used as stables.

Nativity scenes, though, are not an attempt to present a historically accurate picture of where Jesus was born. Rather, scenes of the birth of Jesus remind us of the special love that God shows for us in sending the Son to us. We do not care so much about creating an exact picture of what took place as we do of beholding the beauty and wonder of God born among us.
