2ND SUNDAY OF LENT – FEBRUARY 25, 2024

Mark 9:2-10



"This is My Son, The Beloved..."

As the time of the Passion approaches the foreboding of the disciples grows. Jesus sustains them by this vivid experience of his more than natural nature. On the holy mountain of revelation they see him transformed. It was a real visual experience, though described in symbols familiar from the Bible, brilliant white clothes and so on. Moses and Elijah are seen there because they also had experienced the vision of God on the holy mountain. For

Moses this was at the giving of the Law on Mount Sinai, for Elijah in the cave of Mount Horeb. The disciples were frightened, confused and overcome at the awesome experience, and yet comforted in a way which made Peter want to prolong it. This will later be the rare reaction of Christian mystics, a reassuring terror and a frightening homeliness, the awareness of a presence which is at the same time awesome and comforting, an experience which cannot fully be put into words. The Voice from Heaven is an echo of the Voice at Jesus' Baptism. There, however, it was addressed to Jesus, whereas here it is spoken to the disciples, proclaiming Jesus as authorized teacher, the extension of that same divine voice.

La trasfigurazione occupava un posto importante nella vita e nell'insegnamento della Chiesa primitiva. Ne sono testimonianze le narrazioni dettagliate dei Vangeli e il riferimento presente nella seconda lettera di Pietro (2Pt 1,16-18).

Per i tre apostoli il velo era caduto: essi stessi avevano visto ed udito. Proprio questi tre apostoli sarebbero stati, più tardi, al Getsemani, testimoni della sofferenza di nostro Signore.

L'Incarnazione è al centro della dottrina cristiana. Possono esserci molti modi di rispondere a Gesù, ma per la Chiesa uno solo è accettabile. Gesù è il Figlio Unigenito del Padre, Dio da Dio, Luce da Luce, Dio vero da Dio vero. La vita cristiana è una contemplazione continua di Gesù Cristo. Nessuna saggezza umana, nessun sapere possono penetrare il mistero della rivelazione. Solo nella preghiera possiamo tendere a Cristo e cominciare a conoscerlo.

"È bello per noi stare qui", esclama Pietro, il quale "non sapeva infatti che cosa dire, poiché erano stati presi dallo spavento". La fede pone a tacere la paura, soprattutto la paura di aprire la nostra vita a Cristo, senza condizioni. Tale paura, che nasce spesso dall'eccessivo attaccamento ai beni temporali e dall'ambizione, può impedirci di sentire la voce di Cristo che ci è trasmessa nella Chiesa.

2ND SUNDAY OF LENT – FEBRUARY 25, 2024



Dear Friends in Christ, one of the sacraments that is generally misunderstood involves the Anointing of the Sick. Many Catholics often are reluctant to call the priest in order to have it administered either for themselves, or their ill loved ones. This reluctance can be partly explained

by the fact that, over the centuries, the sacrament was called Extreme Unction and predominantly administered "more and more exclusively on those at the point of death" (cf. CCC 1512). Over the past few decades, however, the Church has made great efforts to present the sacrament as one whereby "the conferral of a special grace [is placed] on the Christian experiencing the difficulties inherent in the condition of grave illness or old age" (CCC 1527). By these words, the Church thus encourages the faithful to seek anointing long before they are in imminent danger of death.

The sacrament of Anointing of the Sick was instituted by Christ. St. Mark alludes to this fact in his Gospel, particularly when he recounts how Jesus commissioned his apostles to go two by two into the various towns with authority over impure spirits: "*They went out and preached that people should repent. They drove out many demons and anointed many sick people with oil and healed them*" (Mk 6:7; 12-13). The classic description of the sacrament, its recommendation to the faithful, and its promulgation within the Christian community comes from St. James, who in his Epistles writes: "*Is any one among you sick? Let him bring in the presbyters [priests] of the Church, and let them pray over him, anointing him with oil in the name of the Lord.* And the prayer of faith will save the sick man, and the Lord will raise him up, and if he be in sins, they shall be forgiven him" (Jm 5:14-15).

Like all sacraments, the Anointing of the Sick is a liturgical celebration. Only priests (bishops and presbyters) can administer the sacrament. The liturgy requires that the forehead and hands of the faithful be anointed with blessed olive oil; oil that is usually consecrated by a bishop within the Chrism Mass celebrated during the Holy Week. The short prayer that accompanies the anointing is: *"Through this holy anointing may the Lord in his love and mercy help you with the grace of the Holy Spirit. May the Lord who frees you from sin save you and raise you up"* (cf. can. 847 §1). These liturgical actions indicate what grace this sacrament confers upon the sick.

Who can receive sacrament? While the anointing used to be predominantly administered to those who were in danger to death, today the Church notes that the sickness required has to be grave, but not necessarily fatal. As the Catechism makes clear: "The Anointing of the Sick is not a sacrament for those only who are at the point of death. Hence, as soon as anyone of the faithful begins to be in danger of death from sickness or old age, the fitting time for him to receive this sacrament has certainly already arrived" (CCC 1514). The anointing can also be administered to those who are preparing for surgery, particularly if it is for a serious operation. It can also be given to the elderly of our communities, especially for those whose frailty has become more pronounced; as well as young children, who have reached the age of reason, suffering from serious illness. Most importantly, unconscious persons may and should be anointed conditionally, that is, provided that the person has been baptized and has shown at least a salutary fear of God's penalty with a sincere repentance for past sins. Unbeknownst to many Catholics is the repeatability of the sacrament, which can be re-administered to a gravely ill person if his/her condition worsens: "If a sick person who received this anointing recovers his health, he can in the case of another grave illness receive this sacrament again. If during the same illness the person's condition becomes more serious, the sacrament may be repeated (CCC 1515).

What are the effects of this sacrament? There are many, including: 1. "the uniting of the sick person to the Passion of Christ, for his own good and that of the whole Church; 2. the strengthening, peace and courage to endure in a Christian manner the sufferings of illness or old age; 3. the forgiveness of sins, if the sick person was not able to obtain it through the sacrament of Penance; 4. the restoration of health, if it is conducive to the salvation of his soul; 5. the preparation for passing over to eternal life" (CCC 1532).

In his series of audience talks on the sacrament, Pope Francis noted how people often hesitated to call the priest to anoint their gravely ill loved ones, or those who are elderly, because "there is this idea that when someone is ill and the priest comes, after him, the hearse will come next." He retorted that such superstition is not true because when the priest comes to the sick person, "it is Jesus who comes to bring comfort, to give strength, to give hope and help, also to forgive sins and this is beautiful. Do not think this is taboo because it is always beautiful knowing that in moments of pain and sickness we are not alone." Indeed, even in the midst of our suffering, and/or when we are faced with the reality of our mortality in the face of imminent death, Christ desires to walk with us and bestow his love and grace upon us, through the sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick. What are the guidelines for producing a passion play? My pastor said there are special guidelines to follow. What are they?

Please read "Criteria for the Evaluation of Dramatizations of the Passion," issued in 1988 by the Bishops' Committee for Ecumenical and Interreligious Affairs of what was then called the National Conference of Catholic Bishops. (The document is located at usccb.org.)

Passion plays should emphasize the saving action of Christ's death and resurrection without becoming stumbling blocks to understanding the role of the Jewish people in salvation history. The document warns that "stock ideas,' unfortunately, can become vividly alive in passion dramatizations. It is all too easy ... to resort to artificial oppositions...to heighten interest or provide sharp contrasts between the characters." We must avoid portraying the Jewish tradition as "a religion of only justice, fear, and legalism with no appeal to the love of God and neighbor."

It is simplistic and incorrect to blame Christ's death on certain historical groups and neglect the complexities of the Gospel portrait and of Christ's life. Christ freely undertook his passion and death because of the sins of all, so that all might attain salvation. This is the truth that passion plays should strive to communicate most clearly.
