3RD SUNDAY OF LENT – MARCH 3, 2024

John 2:13-25

"Destroy this Sanctuary and in three days I will raise IT up..."

According to John, this scene took place at the beginning of Jesus' ministry, on the first of Jesus' four visits to Jerusalem. At each subsequent visit the Temple authorities lay in wait for Jesus, increasingly keen to eliminate him, but unable to do so till his Hour had come. The other gospels place as the final climax both this incident and all other scenes of Jesus in

Jerusalem. Whichever is correct, the incident is the basic cause of Jesus' arrest and tortured death. By his action Jesus had demonstrated that the worship carried out in the Temple was vain in God's eyes and must be superseded. To the Temple authorities this was intolerable, and he must be removed. Again, Jesus demanded a complete reversal of standards. His puzzling saying about building the Temple anew in his body was at last understood by his disciples to mean the Temple that was his Body, the Church. The material building which had been the centre of worship was no longer important. Henceforth all worship would take place in any place, but within the Christian community. The community - or the Church - was now the place of sanctification and of prayer to God.

L'uso delle offerte al tempio dava la garanzia che la gente acquistasse solo quanto era permesso dalla legge. L'incidente riferito nel Vangelo di oggi dà l'impressione che all'interno del tempio stesso si potevano acquistare le offerte e anche altre cose.

Come il salmista, Cristo è divorato dallo "zelo per la casa di Dio" (Sal 068,10). Quando gli Ebrei chiedono a Gesù in nome di quale autorità abbia agito, egli fa allusione alla risurrezione. All'epoca ciò dovette sembrare quasi blasfemo. Si trova in seguito questo commento: "Molti credettero nel suo nome. Gesù però non si confidava con loro, perché conosceva tutti". Noi dobbiamo sempre provare il bisogno di fare penitenza, di conoscerci come Dio ci conosce.

Il messaggio che la Chiesa ha predicato fin dall'inizio è quello di Gesù Cristo crocifisso e risorto. Tutte le funzioni della Quaresima tendono alla celebrazione del mistero pasquale. Che visione straordinaria dell'umanità vi si trova! Dio ha mandato suo Figlio perché il mondo fosse riconciliato con lui, per farci rinascere ad una nuova vita in lui. Eppure, a volte, noi accogliamo tutto ciò con eccessiva disinvoltura. Proprio come per i mercati del tempio, a volte la religione ha per noi un valore che ha poco a vedere con la gloria di Dio o la santità alla quale siamo chiamati.

3RD SUNDAY OF LENT – MARCH 3, 2024



Dear Friends in Christ, there is today a widespread confusion and gradual indifference toward the ministerial priesthood. There are undoubtedly many reasons for this reality. Some, for example, see

the priesthood merely as an occupation, a job, or a profession. In light of such perceptions, priests are effectively considered as being nothing more than ministers of the Gospels, administrators, managers, fundraisers, problem solvers, etc. The diabolical sexual abuses perpetrated by a number of priests, brought into the light over the past few years, have also caused many to show disdain, disrespect, indifference and distrust towards the members of the presbyterate. Given these and other factors, it is easy for many to suggest that the priesthood has outlived its usefulness and thus is no longer necessary for the Church. Yet, nothing can be further from the truth, for it must be said that there can be no Christianity without the priesthood!

In order for us to fully appreciate the ministerial priesthood, we must begin by recalling Old Testament revelation, which provides us with numerous references to it. Priests were an essential group within God's chosen people. They acted as mediators between the people and God, by offering sacrifices (e.g., goats, sheep, oxen, cattle, bread and wine, wheat, barely, oats and fruits) to God. Melchizedek, a priest of God, was the first to offer bread and wine (cf. Gen 14:18). Aaron, his sons and the Levites were specifically consecrated for priestly ministry (cf. Num 3:5-10). The priesthood of the First Covenant anticipated the eternal priesthood of Jesus Christ, which began with his incarnation, continued during his hidden years in Nazareth, and reached its culmination on the Cross of Calvary. Jesus is the one and eternal High Priest, the one true mediator between God and all of humanity (cf. 1 Tim 2:5). It is Our Lord, who continues to intercede for us before the throne of God.

Jesus established the ministerial priesthood, a special vocation whereby He calls certain men to continue his ministry until his return. Jesus instituted the sacrament of Holy Orders during the Last Supper, when after having changed bread and wine into his Body and Blood, he told his apostles to "Do this in memory of me" (Lk 22:19). The Catechism states that "Holy Orders is the sacrament through which the mission entrusted by Christ to his apostles continues to be exercised in the Church until the end of time; thus it is the sacrament of apostolic ministry. It includes three degrees: episcopate (bishops), presbyterate (priests) and diaconate (deacons)" (CCC, 1536). Those who are members of the episcopate (bishops) or presbyterate (priests) receive the mission to act in the name of Christ the Head; deacons are empowered to serve the People of God in the ministries of liturgy, the word, and charity (LG 29a). Thus, only the degrees of the episcopacy and priesthood belong to the clerical priestly ministry in the true sense, and are part of the apostolic succession. They are the ones who serve in *persona Christi*, "in the person of Christ", by manifesting the presence of Christ in the community, and directing others toward salvation and serving to build up the people of God (cf. CCC 1534). Both the imposition of hands (matter), and the consecratory prayer (form) as prescribed in the liturgical books are required for a valid conferral of Holy Orders.

Over the years, especially during these past few decades, there has been a greater call (both from within and outside the Church) to allow women to be ordained to the ministerial priesthood. While it is outside the scope of this Corner to discuss the arguments in favour/against such a call, the Church has essentially considered this a closed issue. In fact, in his 1994 Apostolic Letter, *Ordinatio Sacerdotalis*, St. Pope John Paul II wrote: "Wherefore, in order that all doubt may be removed regarding a matter of great importance, a matter which pertains to the Church's divine constitution itself, in virtue of our ministry of confirming the brethren (cf. Lk 22:32) We declare that the Church has no authority whatsoever to confer priestly ordination on women and that this judgment is to be definitively held by all the Church's faithful - definitive doctrine, infallibly taught by the ordinary universal magisterium of the Church - to be firmly received and held with firm and unconditional assent (c. 750. §2)". With these words, St. John Paul II effectively was asserting that a male-only priesthood is a matter of divine law, which even the pope does not have the power to change!

Let us imagine for a moment what life would look like if Jesus had not instituted the sacrament of Holy Orders that Holy Thursday night. Without the Catholic priesthood there wouldn't be: the Real Presence of Christ in the Eucharist; the holy Sacrifice of the Mass; the possibility of receiving Our Lord in Holy Communion; a way for us to confess our sins and receive forgiveness and absolution for them; a way to experience God's healing power in the Anointing of the Sick; and a way to know the divinely assured teaching of God's revealed truth from the world. In short, without the priesthood of Christ, there would neither be Christianity nor the Catholic faith.

The ministerial priesthood was instituted by Christ, who called certain men to continue His own priestly work of saving and sanctifying the souls, whom He died for on the Cross of Calvary. Let us earnestly to pray to the Lord that He may send his Church good and faithful priests, as He instructed his own disciples, "The harvest truly is plentiful, but the labourers are few. Therefore, pray the Lord of the harvest to send out labourers to His harvest" (Mt. 9:37-38). Pax Christi, **7. Thomas**

My thoughts are my worst enemy. Sometimes they turn to lust and anger. When I recognize what I am thinking, I pray to Jesus and Mary, but I still struggle. What else can I do?

When angry and lustful thoughts enter our consciousness, we should say a prayer and turn our mind to something else. Such thoughts become sins only when we deliberately encourage them or when we make plans to commit the sin. The thoughts themselves are temptations, not sins.

Continue to put your trust in Jesus and Mary, and try to focus on what is good and peaceful. You might also consider what you are letting into your thoughts or imagination: What are you watching on TV or the internet? What music are you listening to? What are you reading? Are those helping to shape your thoughts and imagination in a new direction, or are they contributing to the problem?

A good thing to turn your attention to is God's word in Scripture. You might want to memorize all or part of the following New Testament verse: "Whatever is true, whatever is honorable, whatever is just, whatever is pure, whatever is lovely, whatever is gracious, if there is any excellence and if there is anything worthy of praise, think about these things" (Philippians 4:8). Peacefully reflect on these words when troubled by temptation.
