4TH SUNDAY OF LENT – MARCH 10, 2024

John 3:14-21

"God sent His Son so that through Him the world might be saved..."

After Jesus' conversation with Nicodemus comes this reflection on his visit. Is it Jesus' reflection or the evangelist's? The text does not make it clear. Throughout the gospel of John people are coming to Jesus and judging themselves by their reactions to Jesus. The Father judges no one, but has given all judgment to the Son. In his turn the Son

does not judge, but we judge ourselves by our reaction to him. So at the wedding at 1 Cana the disciples believe in him and see his glory. In the Temple the Jews refuse belief and are condemned. Then comes Nicodemus in secret and in fear. He is sitting on the fence, afraid of the Pharisees, but by the time of the burial he has decided for Jesus. After Nicodemus comes the Samaritan woman, cheeky and unbelieving at first, but won over by Jesus' playful persistence. And so on: the Jews on one side, the man healed at the Pool of Bethzatha on the other; the Jews on one side, the man blind from birth on the other. The decision is ours too: when confronted by Jesus do we come to the light that our deeds may be known, or do we shun the light?

Tutta la nostra vita nella Chiesa è il compimento della nostra risposta a Cristo. L'insegnamento del Nuovo Testamento - e ne vediamo un esempio nella lettura di oggi - è assai preciso. La redenzione è stata realizzata tramite Gesù Cristo, ma per noi deve essere ancora realizzata. Noi possiamo infatti rifiutare la luce e scegliere le tenebre.

Nel battesimo Cristo ci avvolge: noi siamo, per così dire, "incorporati" in lui ed entriamo così in unione con tutti i battezzati nel Corpo di Cristo. Eppure la nostra risposta di uomini, resa possibile dalla grazia di Dio, necessita del nostro consenso personale. Quando c'è anche tale accordo, ciò che facciamo è fatto in Cristo e ne porta chiaramente il segno. Diventiamo allora suoi testimoni nel mondo.





4TH SUNDAY OF LENT – MARCH 10, 2024

Pastor's Corner

Dear Friends in Christ, there is a short video titled, "Entering the Story of Marriage", which I usually ask my couples who are planning to marry to watch before their big wedding day. The central theme of the video is to remind them that their love for each other must always been seen within the context of a greater love story, that is, God's love for all of humanity. In fact, this reality is clearly seen throughout Sacred Scripture, which begins with the creation of Adam and Eve in the image and likeness of God, and ends with John's vision of the wedding feast of the Lamb (cf. CCC 1602).

The Church teaches that marriage is both a natural institution and a sacred union that is rooted in God's divine plan. While it is true that marriage may vary throughout the centuries due to differences in cultural views, social structures, or spiritual attitude, nevertheless, the matrimonial union that is established between a man and a woman is something that has been respected and revered by most people throughout the ages. We acknowledge that God is the author of marriage: "The vocation to marriage is written in the very nature of man and woman as they came from the hand of the Creator.... God who created man out of love also calls him to love - the fundamental and innate vocation of every human being" (cf. CCC 1603-1604).

Sacred Scripture also affirms that man and woman were created for one another. As the opening chapters of the Book of Genesis notes: "It is not good that man should be alone". Upon Eve's creation, Adam recognizes her as "bone of my bones and flesh of my flesh" (Gen 2:23). He sees her as his equal, as a helpmate given by God, resulting in a man to leave his parents "and cling to his wife and they become one flesh" (Gen 2:23); a teaching that Our Lord reiterates during his own Galilean ministry (cf. Mk 10:6-8).

Marriage is defined as "a covenant by which a man and a woman establish between themselves a partnership of the whole of life ordered to the good of the spouses and the procreation of children" (Can. 1055). The spouses commit themselves completely to each other (e.g., intellectually, emotionally, physically, financially, etc.,) for the totality of their lives, and for the wonderful responsibility of bringing children into the world and caring for them.

A valid marriage that involves two baptized Christians is a sacrament. This outward sign of Jesus' love for his Church (cf. Eph 5:25-33) derives from the fact that a man and a woman become "new creatures" in baptism, causing their subsequent marriage to become a sacramental reality. A marriage that involves at least one party who is unbaptized, however, is called a non-sacramental marriage; for it cannot be otherwise. The Church considers a non-sacramental marriage to be a totally legitimate marriage, provided nothing occurred at the celebration that would render it invalid.

According to our Latin tradition, the spouses act as ministers for the sacrament of matrimony. The spouses exchange consent in the presence of the Church using the prescribed words found in the marriage ritual. "The consent consists in a 'human act by which the partners mutually give themselves to each other': 'I take you to be my wife' - 'I take you to be my husband.' This consent that binds the spouses to each other finds its fulfilment in the conjugal act, where the two 'become one flesh'" (CCC 1625-1628).

The spouses receive a number of graces through the sacrament of marriage. They include: the grace to practice generosity; the grace to practice selflessness; the grace to practice humility; the grace of patience; the possibility to experience joy; the grace to practice chastity (yes, even married couples are called to do so as are all unmarried individuals!); the virtue of loyalty, alternatively called fidelity. All these graces the Lord bestows upon the spouses in order to assist them in their vocation to love and serve each other.

St. John Paul II once remarked that "Man cannot fully find himself, except through a sincere gift of himself." It is through the sacrament of marriage that many spouses are able to do Pax Christi, 7r. Thomas so.

St. Teresa of Avila



To have courage for whatever comes in life - everything lies in that." Born in Spain in 1515, St. Teresa of Avila grew up reading and studying about Christian martyrs. Their examples inspired her, to the point where she longed to die a martyr's death. But she would face other tests that would require courage, including illnesses and the death of her family. She stayed courageous to complete God's tasks for her throughout her life. It's impossible to know what a day may bring. God has plans for us, but sometimes those plans take us through difficult times. You must remember to stay courageous, even when the going gets tough.

Dear Padre

In the Church's eyes, what constitutes pornography? Art museums have statues of nude men and women, some of which are quite explicit. Is the only difference the respectability of the venue?

The "respectability" of the location or publisher doesn't matter. A product is pornographic if it was created to sexually arouse users of the product regardless of the venue. Michelangelo's intention in carving his famous statue of David was not to arouse the people who look at it, so the Church does not call it pornography.

Pornography has existed for centuries, but it didn't arrive in our homes uninvited until recently. People with internet access are regularly confronted by pornographic images and literature, and many find it a very powerful temptation. In response, the US bishops issued a helpful document, which is available online at usccb. org: Create in Me a Clean Heart: A Pastoral Response to Pornography.

From this document: "Using and/or producing pornography is a sin against chastity and against human dignity.... The sin of pornography needs the Lord's for-giveness and should be confessed in the sacrament of penance. Pornography objectifies people and brings hurt and pain. It is an illusory substitute for real relationships and intimacy, which in the end bring true joy. Many good people struggle with the sin of pornography and [strive] to cultivate chastity. You are not alone. Jesus is with you, the Church offers you love and support. Trust in the Lord's mercy and his power to free and heal you."
