

PENTECOST SUNDAY - MAY 19, 2024

"The Spirit of Truth will lead you to the Complete Truth..."



In Jesus' final instructions to his disciples, gathered together at the Last Supper, he gives them four little promises about the Advocate whom he will send, send from the Father. 'Advocate' is really a legal term, in both English and the original Greek, and the Spirit will 'testify' on behalf of Jesus. The certainty and definitiveness of this terminology is important. In other sayings Jesus promises that the Advocate will lead his disciples into all truth, enabling them to understand what they cannot yet grasp. With these promises, therefore, we are celebrating the continuing presence of the Spirit, leading the Church into all truth, into a

continuously fuller and more profound understanding of the mystery of Christ. It is through the Spirit that, under the guidance of the Church, each generation and culture is enabled to assimilate and express – sometimes with a wobble or two – the great truths in its own terms, each generation building on the truths perceived by previous guidance. There must be a constant renewal in our personal understanding, under the guidance and testimony of this Advocate speaking through the Church. The Advocate guides our minds, but above all the mind of the teaching Church.



PENTECOST SUNDAY - MAY 19, 2024



Dear Friends in Christ, today the Universal Church celebrates Pentecost Sunday. The first reading, which comes from the Acts of the Apostles, vividly describes the day when the Spirit of God first descended upon the apostles shortly after Jesus' ascension into heaven. Luke writes:

"When the time for Pentecost was fulfilled, they were all in one place together. And suddenly there came from the sky a noise like a strong driving wind, and it filled the entire house in which they were. Then there appeared to them tongues as of fire, which parted and came to rest on each one of them. And they were all filled with the Holy Spirit and began to speak in different tongues, as the Spirit gave them ability" (Acts 2:1-3). In reading these words, one cannot help but see the first signs of the mission of the Holy Spirit in the Church. The Holy Spirit radically transformed the apostles to become zealous and courageous preachers of the Good News of Christ.

That numerous foreigners were able to understand the apostles speak about God's deeds of power in their own language foreshadowed the future mission of the Church. As a sixth century African author aptly remarked: 'The disciples spoke in the language of every nation. At Pentecost God chose this means to indicate the presence of the Holy Spirit: whoever had received the Spirit spoke in every kind of tongue. We must realize, dear brothers, that this is the same Holy Spirit by whom love is poured out in our hearts. It was love that was to bring the Church of God together all over the world. And as individual men who received the Holy Spirit in those days could speak in all kinds of tongues, so today the Church, united by the Holy Spirit, speaks in the language of every people". The Church in its unity continues to speak in the language of every nation today.

Our Lord explained why the Spirit needed to be present among us, so that the Comforter could come to us. Two verses in John's Gospel captures this clearly. Jesus told his disciples: "I have yet many things to say to you, but you cannot bear them now. It is to your advantage that I go away; if I go I will send you the Advocate" (Jn. 16:7). And also: "I will ask the Father and he will give you another Counselor to be with you for ever, the Spirit of truth. He will guide you into all the truth; for he will not speak on his own authority, but whatever he hears he will speak, and he will declare to you the things that are to come. He will glorify me, for he will take what is mine" (Jn. 16: 12-16). In other words, we will only know the things of God through the help of the Holy Spirit. In a similar vein, Saint Hilary remarked: "Since our weak minds cannot comprehend the Father or the Son, we have been given by the Holy Spirit as our intermediary and advocate, to shed light on that hard doctrine of our faith" (cf. treatise On the Trinity).

The Spirit of God is also the dispenser of a multitude of gifts and blessings to the Church and her spiritual children. He sanctifies and guides the people of God by the sacraments and the ministries, and also distributes special graces among the faithful of every state of life: "The Spirit makes one man a teacher of divine truth, inspires another to prophesy, gives another the power of casting out devils, enables another to interpret holy Scripture. The Spirit strengthens one man's self-control, shows another how to help the poor, teaches another to fast and lead a life of asceticism, makes another oblivious to the needs of the body, trains another for martyrdom. His action is different in different people, but the Spirit himself is always the same" (Cat. 16, De Spiritu Sancto, Cyril of Alexandria, Bishop). "By means of these special gifts he equips them and makes them for various activities and responsibilities that benefit the Church in its renewal and its increase" (LG, no. 12). "In each person, the Spirit reveals his presence in a particular way for the common good" (1 Cor. 12:7).

The Holy Spirit dwells in the Church and in the hearts of the faithful. He leads the Church in truth and helps promote unity in both communion and service. He ensures that the faithful will always walk along the right path of faith: "The whole company of the faithful, who have an anointing by the Holy Spirit, cannot err in faith. They manifest this distinctive characteristic of theirs in the supernatural instinct of faith (sensus fidei) of the whole people when, from the bishops to the most ordinary lay person among the faithful, they display a universal agreement on matters of faith and morals. This instinct of faith is awakened and kept in being by the Spirit of truth. Through it the people of God hold indefectibly to the faith once delivered to the saints, penetrate it more deeply by means of right judgment, and apply it more perfectly in their lives. They do all this under the guidance of the sacred teaching office: by faithful obedience to it they receive, not the word of men but in truth the word of God" (LG, no. 12).

Christ's ascension into heaven allowed the Holy Spirit to descend and be with us. For two thousand years, He has remained very active in the Church and will continue to do so until the end of time. "Come, Holy Spirit, fill the hearts of your faithful and kindle in them the fire of your love. Send forth your Spirit and they shall be created, and you shall renew the face of the earth.... Let us pray. O God, who have taught the hearts of the faithful by the light of the Holy Spirit, grant that in the same Spirit we may be truly wise and ever rejoice in his consolation. Through Christ our Lord. Amen." Pax Christi, *7n. Thomas*

Is it a sin to use God's name in profanity?

Profanity is obscene, vulgar language that may or may not include God's name. People may thoughtlessly ask God to condemn a person or a thing in their profanity, but if questioned, admit that they did not mean it literally. They say their angry words were not intended to deliberately ask God to harm someone and deliberate intent is one requirement for what constitutes a sin. God who knows our hearts can determine if our misuse of his name is a form of venting, but the Second Commandment warns us that taking the Lord's name in vain does not please him, even if no harm to another is intended. The danger in constantly and carelessly using God's holy name profanely is that over time we can easily become desensitized to the practice, creating an irreverent attitude toward God that is offensive and may lead others into sin.

Recall that when we pray, "Hallowed be thy name" in the Lord's Prayer-the prayer Jesus taught his disciples—we ask God to enable us to give him the reverence that is due; it comes first before we ask anything for ourselves-a sure sign of our respect for God.

Because God's name is holy, we mustn't abuse it. Despite the erosion of inhibitions against poor word choices in our time, consider this prayerful petition from the last verse of Psalm 19: "Let the words of my mouth be acceptable, / the thoughts of my heart before you, / LORD, my rock and my redeemer." .


