29TH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME - OCTOBER 20, 2024

Mark 10, 35-45



"The Son of Man came to Give His Life as a Ransom for Many ... "

Three times in Mark's gospel does Jesus formally tell his disciples about his coming Passion, and each time they seem entirely deaf to it. So each time Jesus counters their misunderstanding by repeating the need of a disciple to follow him in suffering. Today's reading

begins just after the third prophecy, and – true to form – the sons of Zebedee reply with a request for the best seats at the banquet of the Kingdom! Matthew spares the two disciples by putting the request in their poor mother's mouth. Only in a second exchange with Jesus do they woodenly accept to share Jesus' 'cup' and 'baptism'. Do they really know what they are accepting, or do they just blithely agree? The indignation of the other disciples prompts Jesus to his clearest statement in words that authority in the Church is a service. His clearest statement in action is the smelly business of washing their travel-gnarled feet at his last meal with them. The lesson is difficult to assimilate, for authority corrupts even at this level. At the ordination of a priest the Church still speaks of 'the dignity of the priesthood' rather than 'the service of the priesthood'.



Il suo prototipo è il Messia, diventato piuttosto il Figlio dell'uomo, schiavo di tutti gli schiavi, per il riscatto dei quali egli offre quello che possiede e quello che è: tutto. Egli ha appena formulato il suo progetto di comunità, la sua carta "costituzionale", alla quale tutti i partecipanti devono aderire: ognuno è servitore di tutti.

Dear Friends in Christ, in 1989 Peter Weir directed the critically acclaimed film, "Dead Poet Society", winning the Academy Award for Best Original Screenplay. The film, set in the 1950's at the all-boys preparatory school Welton Academy, follows the English teacher, John Keating (played

by Robin Williams). Through a series of unconventional teaching practices, Keating inspired his students to embrace poetry, to follow their passions by breaking free from the shackles of societal expectations, and to "seize the day" (*Carpe diem* in Latin).

Carpe diem ("seize the day")! These words have been on my mind as I reflect on a number of coincidental turn of events that have occurred recently. A few weeks ago (as I wrote last weekend), my brother-in-law, Poe, suddenly suffered bleeding in his brain and was admitted to ICU at Toronto Western. Although Poe is no longer in a coma, he remains in critical condition. Thank you for your prayers! Shortly after Poe's medical situation, I received a call from a good friend of mine, Fr. Zack Romanosky, asking for prayers. Apparently, his brother, John, who is married with a young child, was also admitted to the ICU at a hospital in Pittsburgh after experiencing bleeding in his brain. Fortunately, John's condition was not critical and the doctors expect a full recovery for him. If these two incidents were not perplexing enough, shortly after this, another close friend of mine, Fr. Peter Choi (Pastor of Sacred Heart Korean Parish) texted me the tragic story of one of his parishioners. Son, who recently retired and moved to Toronto with her husband, suffered a massive brain aneurysm while playing golf and died on the 16th hole at a local golf course in Toronto! Three different individuals; three bleeding of the brain; three very different outcomes for each person!

While some who are reading this Corner might begin to offer different theories as to why these three unrelated, disconcerting set of events happened during such a small window of time, I (for my part) will neither speculate nor conjecture on the "how" and "why" of these events. Rather, I believe that all these sudden, dramatic turn of events are really poignant reminders for us in regards to the fragility of our human bodies and the transient nature of our earthly existence. In other words, they should serve as a reminder on how hastily and unceremoniously our lives can be interrupted, or terminated without any warning whatsoever. Moreover, they should act as a catalyst for us to "seize the day", that is, to truly live each moment of our life faithfully and fully, given that we may never know what surprises and challenges tomorrow may offer us, should tomorrow even come at all!

The idea of *Carpe diem* ("seize the day") can have many different connotations from a Christian perspective. My favorite interpretation, however, comes from the author, Thomas à Kempis, who wrote the spiritual masterpiece, The Imitation of Christ. In his thoughts on death (cf. Book 1, Chapter 23), Kempis wrote these powerful words that can be used as food for our personal reflection: "Very soon your life here will end; consider, then, what may be in store for you elsewhere. Today we live; tomorrow we die and are quickly forgotten. Oh, the dullness and hardness of a heart which looks only to the present instead of preparing for that which is to come! Therefore, in every deed and every thought, act as though you were to die this very day". Kempis reminds his reader to seize the "seize the day" when he states: "In the morning consider that you may not live till evening, and when evening comes do not dare to promise yourself the dawn. Be always ready, therefore, and so live that death will never take you unprepared. Many die suddenly and unexpectedly, for in the unexpected hour the Son of God will come. And how does one live this day? By practicing ... "Perfect contempt of the world, a lively desire to advance in virtue, a love for discipline, the works of penance, readiness to obey, self-denial, and the endurance of every hardship for the love of Christ, these will give a man great expectations of a happy death.... The present is very precious; these are the days of salvation; now is the acceptable time. How sad that you do not spend the time in which you might purchase everlasting life in a better way. The time will come when you will want just one day, just one hour in which to make amends, and do you know whether you will obtain it?... Learn to die to the world now, that then you may begin to live with Christ. Learn to spurn all things now, that then you may freely go to Him.... Think of nothing but your salvation. Care only for the things of God.... Keep yourself as a stranger here on earth, a pilgrim whom its affairs do not concern at all. Keep your heart free and raise it up to God, for you have not here a lasting home. To Him direct your daily prayers, your sighs and tears, that your soul may merit after death to pass in happiness to the Lord." In light of Kempis's powerful words, let us each resolve to *carpe diem*, "seize the day"! Pax Christi, Fr. Thomas

October 20, 2024

I read about bishops with different titles: coadjutor, auxiliary, ordinary. What is the difference between all of these bishops?

All bishops in the Church are ordained in the same way. Bishops are the only people who can ordain other people in the Church. Bishops also have authority regarding Church matters. A bishop who is the *ordinary* of a diocese is the head of that diocese. He has the authority to guide and direct matters in the diocese. Like all other bishops, he has the responsibility to teach and preach in the name of the Church.

A bishop who is an *auxiliary* is assigned to help the ordinary of the diocese. His responsibilities are given to him by the ordinary. In most circumstances, the auxiliary will help in the administration of the diocese and celebrate the sacraments within the diocese.

A coadjutor bishop is assigned to aid the ordinary of the diocese. He usually has the right to succeed the ordinary once he retires or dies in office. In some circumstances, coadjutor bishops may be given authority that is normally reserved to the ordinary.

The differences between these bishops are the tasks they perform and the authority they have within a diocese. However, as bishops, they all receive the same ordination.


