

Luke 1:39 - 45

"And how does this happen to me, that the mother of my Lord should come to me?"

Luke's account of the birth and infancy of Jesus is built on the comparison and contrast of the two stories of John the Baptist and Jesus: the annunciation to the parents, the birth of each, the joy on earth and in heaven, the circumcision, the growth of the child. In each incident

John is shown to be great, but Jesus greater still. Only in this incident do the two families meet, the two stories cross. The two mothers meet each other to marvel at the destiny of their children. The journey from Nazareth to even the nearest of the towns in the hill country of Judah (traditionally Elizabeth's home is located at Ain Karim, now on the outskirts of Jerusalem) would have been arduous, a week's walk for a fit young woman. This special exertion and generosity shows her love and care for her elderly relative, as well as the natural excitement of the two in sharing their motherhood. Luke has already told us that Mary was filled with the Holy Spirit. Now Elizabeth too is filled with the Holy Spirit as they share and exchange the praise of God for the gift of their child.

Maria è la nuova arca dell'Alleanza, davanti alla quale il bambino esprime la sua gioia. Dal bambino l'azione dello Spirito è trasmessa anche ad Elisabetta, cosa che la conduce a riconoscere la Madre del suo Signore. Sotto l'ispirazione dello Spirito, conosce il mistero del messaggio dell'angelo a sua cugina Maria, e la riconosce "felice" in ragione della fede con la quale ella l'ha ricevuto. La testimonianza di Elisabetta è la più antica testimonianza della venerazione della prima Chiesa per la Madre del Salvatore.

Pastor's Corner

Dear Friends in Christ, there is a song written by Carey Landry titled, "Peace Is Flowing Like a River." If neither the artist nor the title of the song rings a bell, perhaps the words of one of her stanzas might jolt your memory: "Peace is flowing like a river, flowing out through you and me; Flowing out into the desert, setting all the captives free." In reading Landry's lyrics, it appears to me as if she views peace as being a force that has the power to cause change in people and in the world. If my interpretation of her music is correct, the Christian understanding of peace is deeper than that however!

The word "peace" is a biblical term that has numerous meanings associated with it. In the Old Testament, the Hebraic word for peace is *shalôm*, which literally means "to be complete or whole". The Jewish people used *shalôm* to mean general prosperity or well-being, safety or success, harmony among friends and family, harmony among nations. The Greeks used the word *eirene* for peace, a word that often implied an inner harmony that a person experiences, that is, an inner peace without internal conflict or hostile feelings (cf. Msgr Swetland, "A Primer for Peace).

From our Catholic perspective true peace comes from God (cf. Phil. 4:17) and it is a fruit of the Holy Spirit (Gal. 5:22). When Jesus was born in Bethlehem, for example, the angles promised "peace to men of good will." Throughout his Galilean ministry, Jesus often told forgiven sinners and those he healed to "go in peace." At the Last Supper, Jesus told his disciples: "Do not let your hearts be troubled. Trust in God, and trust in me" and "Peace I give to you, my peace I give to you, a peace the world cannot give, this is my gift to you. Do not let your hearts be troubled or afraid" (Jn. 14:27). If Jesus' last words before his death involved peace, it should come as no surprise that when Jesus encountered his disciples on the evening of His resurrection, he would greet them with the words, "Peace be with you", not once but twice! Jesus regularly dispensed the gift of peace to those he interacted with.

It should be noted that there are two kinds of peace: an external and an internal kind. The external peace is that which is found outside of us and it usually deals with the harmonious relationship that exists between people. External peace is present when nations do not wage war with each other, or when diverse groups of people (e.g., classes, religions, languages, cultures, etc.,) work and live in harmony with one another without being in conflict. External peace occurs at the familial level when husband and wife, parents and children, relative and neighbour, etc., live in harmony by showing mutual respect for one another. Unfortunately, external peace is sorely lacking in many of these situations today throughout our world!

Internal peace, however, is peace that is found within us. This is the kind of peace we have when there is no conflict in us, or when we experience a great sense of tranquility within us. We can have peace with God when our conscience is clean and we are in a state of grace, that is, not in a state of mortal sin. We have interior peace with others when we remove all grudges, ill feeling or enmity, or animosity towards them. We have interior peace when our disordered passion, which often tries to enslave us, is governed by our reason and selfcontrol.

If we are to make the world a more peaceful place, then it requires that we first must have internal peace within ourselves. There can be no harmony among people, when we do not experience peace within ourselves. There can be no resolutions of conflicts among people unless the conflicts within our hearts are tended to. The difficult task of trying to be at peace with others can only be effectively accomplished when we find peace within our own heart. It is the internal peace that is established within individuals that becomes the source of external peace among nations, families, communities, including within the church.

In a few days, we will celebrate the Nativity of our Lord. On the night when our Lord was born in Bethlehem, a multitude of angels praised God by saying, "Glory to God in the highest heaven, and on earth peace among those whom he favours!" (Lk 2: 14). I invite you to go to the Child Jesus, who humbly lies in the manger for the love of you and me, and ask him to bless you with his peace, a peace unlike anything the world can offer you!

On behalf of Fr. Russell, Fr. Giuseppe, and Julia, I wish to extend a warm Christmas blessing to you and all your loved ones. Please be assured that all your intentions will be remembered in each Holy Mass celebrated during the Christmas Season. May the Infant Child, Jesus, bless you!

Where does the Hail Mary prayer

The Hail Mary owes its origin to the ro-

In the twelfth century, religious orders

recited together the 150 psalms as a

way to mark the hours of the day and the days of the week. In order to pray

the psalms, though, people had to

know how to read. People who didn't

know how to read wanted to share in

the practice, so the rosary, or praying on beads, began as a parallel prayer

practice. It was a way that illiterate

people could remember the Lord and

The first rosaries consisted of a

string of 150 beads, and, much as we

do now, a person would pass over

each bead after saying a prayer, usually the Our Father. Later, people

added the Archangel Gabriel's greet-

ing-"Hail Mary, full of grace, the

Lord is with thee"—and later still, Elizabeth's prayer we hear in today's Gos-

pel-"Blessed art thou among wom-

en." Finally this prayer was added in

the sixteenth century: "Holy Mary,

Mother of God, pray for us sinners,


