Luke 6: 27-38

## "Be merciful, just as your Father is Merciful."



Luke's version of the Beatitudes puts the emphasis not on Christian attitudes, as Matthew's version does, but on the blessing on those in real, dire need. Now Luke continues this with our duty to respond to those in need, even if they are hostile, even if they hate us. There must be no calculation whether we will get back money or property lent, no limit to how much we lend or give. At first it seems that Luke is concerned only with money, and indeed he is so concerned, for he is always warning of the

danger of possessions and the need to use them for those who have none. Luke is proclaiming Christ's Good News to a more affluent society than Mark or Matthew, and places all the more emphasis on the danger of wealth. But after dealing with money Luke goes on to other acts of generosity. We must not judge, but must forgive in order to obtain forgiveness. Most of all, we must be compassionate. Whereas Matthew ends his instructions here with the general, 'Be perfect just as your heavenly Father is perfect', Luke focuses on compassion, 'Be compassionate just as your Father is compassionate'. It is an affair of the heart: we must be emotionally involved with those in need.

È come se ci dicesse: non si trionfa sul male con il male; non si trionfa sulla violenza con la violenza. Il male e la violenza sono vinti quando li si lascia dissolvere, senza rilanciarli con una risposta analoga. L'odio non può essere distrutto che dall'amore che lo subisce gratuitamente.

Non è vero che noi non possiamo evitare, a queste parole, un movimento di rifiuto? Non hanno l'apparenza della follia, abituati come siamo a vedere trionfare il potere e l'aggressività dei forti, mentre il male si accanisce sui deboli e i disarmati? Questi ordini non sarebbero il frutto delle divagazioni di un sognatore che non ha l'esperienza della crudeltà spietata del nostro mondo? Di Gesù si può dire qualsiasi cosa, tranne che non abbia conosciuto la cattiveria. Egli ha conosciuto bene che cosa voleva dire essere detestato, spogliato, percosso e ucciso. In realtà, è il solo uomo che può dire quello che noi abbiamo appena ascoltato senza la più piccola leggerezza, perché in lui, e in lui solo, queste parole furono verità. Egli ha amato coloro che lo odiavano, ha dato più di quanto non gli fosse stato tolto, egli ha benedetto coloro che lo maledicevano.

Solo così questa condotta viene giustificata. Non è il prodotto di una saggezza profana, che implicherebbe una irresponsabilità criminale. Non è qui un politico o sociologo di questo mondo che parla. Colui che parla ha superato il male attraverso la sofferenza. Ed è per questo che la sola giustificazione possibile di questi comandamenti di Gesù è la sua croce. Solo colui che dice "sì" alla croce di Cristo può obbedire a tali precetti e trovare nell'obbedienza il compimento della promessa contenuta in essi: il bene trionfa sul male attraverso l'amore.

## 7<sup>th</sup> Sunday in Ordinary Time ~ February 23, 2025



Dear Friends in Christ, a few years ago I watched a movie titled, "The Railway Man." The 2014 movie, which starred Colin Firth and Nicole Kidman, depicted the real life story of a former British soldier named, Eric Lomax, who was captured by the Japanese during the Second World War. Like many other POWs at that time, Eric was taken to Thailand to build the so-called "Death Railway."

During his imprisonment, Eric suffered numerous forms of abuse from the Japanese soldiers. These included severe beatings that caused several of his bones to be broken, waterboarding, hunger and malnutrition, and exposure to the natural elements. Although most of the Japanese soldiers took turns inflicting pain and suffering upon Eric and his fellow POWs, one stood out among them – a man named, Nagase Takashi, who acted as their interpreter. Nagase continually threatened Eric with death and repeatedly accused him of being a spy.

Eric's nightmare eventually ended when he and the other prisoners were freed by the Americans shortly after Japan's surrender in 1945. Although Eric became a 'free' man, he suffered from PTSD, developed an intense hatred of his Japanese inquisitor, and harboured a desire for revenge. It was only with the help and encouragement of his second wife, Patricia Wallace, that Eric was willing to deal with his unresolved issues and seek closure for that chapter of his life.

In 1993, Eric meet Nagase in Thailand. During their first meeting together, Nagase asked Eric to forgive him amidst tears and trembling. The former British soldier realized that, in a way, Nagase had also been psychologically tortured all those years by remorse. While the Japanese army's treatment of the POWs who worked the railway was undoubtedly cruel, many of the soldiers acted in that manner by way of indoctrination. As one commentator noted: "Years of schooling had indoctrinated young Japanese men with the notion of Emperor worship, and their training to become soldiers in their native country was based on brutality. The soldiers were also taught to fight with relentless ferocity as part of the Japanese counter-insurgency against Mao Tse-Tung's forces. All of these factors played a part in creating soldiers who could carry out the cruelest acts of torture without a second thought" (Source, History Extra). After that initial meeting, the former enemies promised to keep in touch through letters and phone calls and incredibly over time they became friends. As Eric later remarked, "After our meeting I felt I'd come to some kind of peace and resolution. Forgiveness is possible when someone is ready to accept forgiveness. Sometimes the hating has to stop."

Our gospel passage today comes from the second part of Luke's account of Jesus' Sermon on the Plain. Moses once instructed the Israelites, "You will love the Lord, your God, with all your heart, all your soul, all your mind and all your strength, and you will love your neighbor as yourself." But Jesus took this teaching ones step further by exhorting his disciples, "I say to you that listen: Love your enemies, do good to those who hate you, bless those who curse you, pray for those who abuse you" (Lk. 6:27).

Many will undoubtedly have a hard time accepting or understanding Jesus' words. Why? Because many will not comprehend the true meaning of 'love' that Jesus requires that we give to our enemies. In fact, this should not be surprising given that the word 'love' today is often used in connection to our emotions, passions and feelings, or in the context of romance. Yet, let us be clear that Jesus was not speaking about feelings or emotions; rather, he was talking about actions.

The Greek word, *agape*, that is used in today's gospel, signifies a kind of complete, total and sacrificial love. Against this backdrop, to "love your enemies" means to perform good actions towards them. It means that we are to refrain from committing the proverbial ancient teaching, 'an eye for an eye," or "a tooth for a tooth," that has been practiced by so many people throughout human history. As followers of Christ, we are called not to return evil with evil; rather, we respond good with evil.

To love one's enemies also means that we "bless" those who curse us. The word "benedire" comes from the Latin word that consist of "bene" (meaning "well" or "good") and "dicere" (meaning "to say" or "to speak"). To bless someone here can mean two things: to bestow a person a good action, or to speak well of them. Conversely, a curse, which comes from the Latin, maledire, means "to speak badly of" or "to curse". And, so, what this means is that if someone should curse us, our response should be to bless them, that is, to verbalize a desire for good upon that person.

I know that carrying out Jesus' precept to love our enemies is a difficult one to carry out even in the best of times. Yet, if we struggle in carrying out Our Lord's command, perhaps we do well to reflect upon how often the Lord has been merciful and compassionate toward us! As the psalmist reminds us: "The Lord is merciful and gracious, slow to anger and abounding in steadfast love. He does not deal with us according to our sins, nor repay us according to our iniquities. As a father has compassion for his children, so the Lord has compassion for those who fear him" (Ps. 103). In light of his continual love and mercy, pray to the Lord then for the grace to "love our enemies, do good to those who hate us, bless those who curse us, and pray for those who abuse us."

## Dear Padre,

My ex broke up with me. I find myself hoping he gets subjected to the same emotional pain as I have. I hate feeling this way, so how do I ask God to take away this pain and help me forgive my ex?

What you are sharing is your hurt and confusion. Although your boyfriend was ready to end the relationship, you were not. It seems you are still not ready to move on. That is OK. Everyone has his or her own manner of dealing with disappointment, and there is no perfect timeframe.

More than your boyfriend's suffering, you desire freedom for yourself and a return to a healthy sense of your own personhood. You perceive him as happy and perhaps wonder how that's possible while you are still struggling. This is all very normal, and it's part of the process we all experience when an important relationship changes.



You will work through this. You will love again. You will no longer be triggered by strong feelings when you encounter him in the future. But you are going to have to do the hard work of growing, maturing, and learning to let go. Begin by praying for his well-being. And if you can't do that, ask God for the grace to want to pray for his well-being. Certainly, the Lord will help you, but he won't magically take away your pain. There are no shortcuts. •


