4TH SUNDAY OF LENT ~ MARCH 30, 2025

Luke 15:1-3, 11-32 Your brother was dead and has come to life again.



Today's gospel reading gives us a particularly attractive Lukan story of forgiveness. The story of the Prodigal Son is told with all Luke's love, artistry and delicacy of characterstudy. The wastrel son goes back home not because he is repentant, but simply because he is hungry. The loving father is perpetually on the look-out, despite the fact that the

boy has written his father off with his implied 'I don't care whether you are alive or dead, I want my money'. He runs to meet the son, interrupting the carefullyprepared speech and pampering the returned wastrel. A chicken would have made a good party, or perhaps a lamb; but a fattened calf will feed the whole village! When the father loves the elder son enough to leave his guests at the party and go out into the field, the disgruntled stay-at-home invents slanders about the other's 'loose women' and is gently corrected by his father's 'your brother'.

Luke's characters are always a bit like ourselves, good and bad at the same time. As here, they often reflect on their situation, 'What shall 1 do now?' (Build new barns to fit my harvest - ingratiate myself with my master's debtors - compose a pretty speech to soothe dad's anger)

An unforgettable picture of the overflowing love and forgiveness of God.

La nostalgia di una comunione perduta risveglia in lui un altro desiderio: riprendere il cammino del focolare familiare.

Questo desiderio del cuore, suscitato dalla grazia, è l'inizio della conversione che noi chiediamo di continuo a Dio. Siamo sempre sicuri dell'accoglienza del padre.

La figura del fratello maggiore ci ricorda che non ci comportiamo veramente da figli e figlie se non proviamo gli stessi sentimenti del padre. Il perdono passa per il riconoscimento del bisogno di essere costantemente accolti dal Padre. Solo così la Pasqua diventa per il cristiano una festa del perdono ricevuto e di vera fratellanza.



4TH SUNDAY OF LENT ~ MARCH 30, 2025



Dear Friends in Christ, in my previous Pastor's Corner written on the 28th Sunday in Ordinary Time 2024, I shared with you how my brother-in-law, Poe, suffered from some bleeding in his brain and had to be admitted to the ICU unit at Toronto General. Despite numerous CT scans, MRIs,

ultrasounds, etc., his medical team was not able to determine the true cause and source of his bleeding. As his conditions stabilized, Poe was eventually transferred to Mackenzie Hospital in Richmond Hill, where he underwent a personal "Way of the Cross." With the help of Maria, his sons and many family members and friends, Poe patiently embraced his suffering and carried his cross with courage. Sadly, Poe died this past Wednesday (26 March 2025), six months to the day since he first suffered the bleeding in his brain.

To say that Poe's sudden death was a shock for our family and his medical team (e.g., doctors, nurses, therapists, etc.,) is an understatement. Although Poe had suffered numerous serious medical episodes during these past few months, his health nevertheless appeared to steadily improve with the wonderful help of those caring for him. In fact, his doctors were so optimistic about his prognosis that they were making preparations to discharge him from the hospital within a matter of weeks. Given that Poe has been bed-ridden for all these months, the doctors informed us that he still needed help in rehabilitating his motor and speech skills, one that would be best suited in a long-term care facility. As a result, our family began to look for possible places that could play a role in helping Poe begin the next stage of his recovery. And, so, inquires were made and just as quickly ceased with his untimely death.

As I reflect upon Poe's unexpected death, one of the first thoughts that comes to mind are the words the Lord said to his people through the prophet Isaiah. "For my thoughts are not your thoughts, neither are your ways my ways, says the Lord. For as the heavens are higher than the earth, so are my ways higher than your ways, and my thoughts than your thoughts" (Isa. 55:8-9). The Lord spoke these words because he wanted his people to keep their focus on his restoration promises for them after their exile in Babylon. The Lord's words, however, contain a timeless truth that we would do well to keep before our mind. God's wisdom, plans, and understanding are far beyond our human comprehension.

While the doctors, who in using their expert medical skills, truly believed that Poe had turned the corner, the fact remain that God alone knew the real extent of Poe's condition and the true state of his soul. That the Lord called Poe to himself without any warning, in spite of the presence of positive signs of recovery, show that God's plans are indeed beyond our human understanding. Nevertheless, the Lord's actions (including the unexpected death of our loved ones) remain good for the Lord alone knows what is best for his children. As people of faith, when we face the realities of pain, sufferings, trials, tribulations and even death, we need to continually seek Him, receive His abundant grace, and trust in His wisdom.

One more thought comes to mind - the need to always be ready for our own death! On a number of occasions Jesus taught his disciples that no one knows the exact time of his return. "But of the day and hour no man knows, no, not the angels of heaven, but my Father only" (Mt. 24:36). "Watch, therefore, for you know neither the day nor the hour when the Son of Man comes" (Mt. 25:13). These verses serve as a powerful reminder of the importance of always being spiritually alert and prepared at all times. We must continually live our faith and avoid being complacent and indifferent given that the Lord can return at any time. This does not mean that we should remain in a state of anxiety or anxiousness concerning the unknown; rather, we are called to have a lifestyle of watchfulness, remaining vigilant for the day when we are called from this world, whether it is suddenly and/or unexpected as was the case for Poe, or slowly and expectantly. Let us be vigilant and ready!

I will miss Poe for many reasons including the many hours we spent together around the dinner table. Although I was undoubtedly surprised by his sudden death, I nevertheless accept God's will for him, for the Lord truly knew what was best for Poe. I kindly ask that you pray for the repose of Poe's soul, and that the grace of consolation and well-being be given to those Poe left behind, especially my sister, Maria, and her two boys, Dominic and Lucas. Thank you and blessings to you!

Dear Padre,

Is it OK if I receive holy Communion more than once a day? Part of my routine is to go to early morning Mass in my parish, even on days I know I'm going to another Mass, like a wedding or funeral, or sometimes another Mass for that day.

The Catechism of the Catholic Church teaches that by the very nature of what the Eucharist intends and celebrates, those who participate in the great mystery of our faith should "receive the Lord's Body" (1388). In other words, reception of holy Communion is strongly recommended and is understood as the ordinary practice for all who participate in the Mass. Proper preparation and disposition are presumed as both necessary and important.

In response to a specific "dubium" or question about this practice and expectation, in 1984 the Pontifical Commission on the Code of Canon Law

issued an authentic interpretation of the Church's understanding of this practice. It mandated that "the faithful may receive the Holy Eucharist only a second time on the same day" (CCC, 1388, footnote 222). This directive is intended to establish the general norm and practice for the reception of holy Communion. Your practice, as a result of this norm, is directly representative of the understanding of the Church.


