

FEAST OF THE DEDICATION OF THE LATERAN BASILICA ~ NOVEMBER 9, 2025



Dear Friends in Christ, the word indulgence (Lat. *indulgentia*, from *indulgeo*, to be kind or tender) originally meant kindness or favor, but later became understood to mean the remission of a tax or debt. From a theological point of view, the word became associated with God's mercy and kindness. For our purpose, however, "An indulgence is a remission before God of the temporal punishment due to sins whose

guilt has already been forgiven, which the faithful Christian who is duly disposed gains under certain prescribed conditions through the action of the Church which, as the minister of redemption, dispenses and applies with authority the treasury of the satisfactions of Christ and the saints" (cf. can. 992 & CCC 1471). "An indulgence is partial or plenary according as it removes either part or all of the temporal punishment due to sin" (*Indulgentiarum Doctrina*, n.1-2).

In order to help you understand this definition further, allow me to add an additional caveat. "In the Sacrament of Baptism, not only is guilt of sin remitted, but also all the penalties attached to sin. In the Sacrament of Penance the guilt of sin is removed, and with it the eternal punishment due to mortal sin; but there still remains the temporal punishment required by Divine justice, and this requirement must be fulfilled either in the present life or in the world to come, i.e., in Purgatory (q.v.). An indulgence offers the penitent sinner the means of discharging this debt during his life on earth" (cf. "Indulgences: Treatment of the practice of granting indulgences, Catholic Answers Encyclopedia).

In general, a person must meet certain prescribed conditions and perform certain prescribed works before he/she is able to gain an indulgence. The "General remarks on Indulgences" from Gift of the Indulgence summarizes the usual conditions given in the Church's law (cf. Apostolic Penitentiary, Prot. N. 39/05/I):

- 1) "To gain indulgences, whether plenary or partial, it is necessary that the faithful be in the state of grace at least at the time the indulgenced work is completed."
- 2) "A plenary indulgence can be gained only once a day. In order to obtain it, the faithful must, in addition to being in the state of grace: have the interior disposition of complete detachment from sin, even venial sin [If one's disposition is less than perfect or if some of the above conditions are not fulfilled, the indulgence becomes partial]; have sacramentally confessed their sins; receive the Holy Eucharist; prayers for the intentions of the Supreme Pontiff"
- 3) "It is appropriate, but not necessary, that the sacramental Confession and especially Holy Communion and the prayer for the Pope's intentions take place on the same day that the indulgenced work is performed; but it is sufficient that these sacred rites and prayers be carried out within several days (about 20) before or after the indulgenced act. Prayer for the Pope's intentions is left to the choice of the faithful, but an "Our Father" and a "Hail Mary" are suggested. One sacramental Confession suffices for several plenary indulgences, but a separate Holy Communion and a separate prayer for the Holy Father's intentions are required for each plenary indulgence."
- 4) "Indulgences can always be applied either to oneself or to the souls of the deceased, but they cannot be applied to other persons living on earth."

During the month of November, the Church offers a number of acts, which the faithful can perform in order to obtain indulgences that are applicable only to the holy souls in purgatory. These include: 1) A plenary indulgence to the faithful who: i) devoutly visit cemetery and pray, if only mentally, for the departed, on any and each day from November 1 to 8; ii) on All Souls' Day devoutly visit a church or an oratory and recite an Our Father and the Creed; 2) A partial indulgence to the faithful who: i) devoutly visit a cemetery and at least mentally pray for the dead; ii) devoutly recite lauds or vespers from the Office of the Dead or the prayer Eternal Rest (*Requiem Aeternam*).

A faithful can obtain common plenary indulgences throughout the year. These include: adoration of the Blessed Sacrament for at least 30 minutes; praying the Rosary in a church, family, or religious community; performing the Way or Stations of the Cross; reading or meditating on Scripture for at least 30 minutes; receiving the Pope's Christmas and Easter blessings, even if it is via TV or internet, if devoutly followed; devoutly attending the First Communion or First Mass of a newly ordained priest; renewal of Baptismal Promises at the Easter Vigil or on Divine Mercy Sunday; receiving Communion on Divine Mercy Sunday; visiting a parish church on its titular feast day (including recitation of the Our Father and Creed); reciting the *Te Deum* on December 31st in thanksgiving for the year; and reciting the *Veni Creator Spiritus* on January 1st or Pentecost. There are undoubtedly more....

The faithful can also obtain partial indulgences throughout the year by performing certain actions. These include: making the sign of the Cross with devotion; reading the Bible for less than 30 minutes; using holy water devoutly (e.g., when entering a church); reciting the Angelus or Regina Caeli; praying the Anima Christi or Memorare; reciting the Guardian Angel prayer; visiting the Blessed Sacrament for less than 30 minutes; praying for the dead, even outside of cemetery visits; wearing or kissing a blessed crucifix, scapular, or medal devoutly; saying grace before and after meals. There are no limits to the number of partial indulgences a person can gain in a day. The faithful can use the indulgences for him/herself, or offer them for the holy souls in Purgatory. A person must also be in a state of grace and at least have the general intention to gain the indulgences.

I truly encourage each of you to obtain as many indulgences as you can and to offer them for the holy souls in purgatory, during not only the month of November but also every day. What a wonderful act of love and unity we make, when we help hasten the journey of these poor holy souls, who long to see the beatific vision of God in heaven.

"Jesus was speaking about the temple of his Body."



""To dedicate or consecrate" a place to God is a ritual that is found in every religion. To "reserve" a place to God is an act of recognizing His glory and honor."

"In the year 313 the Roman emperor Constantine published the Edict of Milan, granting religious freedom to Christians. Constantine himself donated the palace of the Lateran, a portion of his wife's dowry, to the Church for its first basilica. The Lateran is the cathedral of the Bishop of Rome, the pope, and, as such, it ranks as the "mother and head of all the churches in the city and the world." From its dedication on this

date in 324 until the 15th century, the Lateran was the residence of the popes."2

"The church was destroyed several times in the course of the centuries, and always rebuilt. The final reconstruction took place under the pontificate of Benedict XIII. The church was rededicated in 1724. It was at that time that the feast celebrated today was established and extended to the universal Church."

"Un rito per riconoscere a Dio gloria e onore è "dedicargli" un luogo. Più volte distrutta durante il corso dei secoli, la basilica di San Giovanni in Laterano fu sempre ricostruita, e l'ultima sua riconsacrazione avvenne nel 1724. In quell'occasione venne stabilita ed estesa a tutta la cristianità la festa che oggi celebriamo. Ora, è interessante che proprio per questa festa la Chiesa scelga di proclamare liturgicamente il brano della "purificazione del tempio" da parte di Gesù. Gesto accompagnato nel Vangelo di Giovanni da queste parole: «"Distruggete questo tempio e in tre giorni lo farò risorgere"... Egli parlava del tempio del suo corpo». Ecco la grande rivelazione: ormai la dimora di Dio non si trova più nel tempio di Gerusalemme – né in alcun altro luogo "sacro" –, ma il corpo di Gesù è la vera dimora di Dio.

Il luogo dove tutti gli umani possono incontrare Dio è Gesù, un uomo, una carne umana che è anche la Parola di Dio, il Figlio stesso di Dio. Grazie alla fede post-pasquale possiamo confessare che il Cristo morto e risorto è il tempio escatologico, il luogo di incontro, alleanza e comunione tra Dio e noi!

Dio è presente ovunque, ma c'è un luogo in cui Egli abita in modo unico e speciale: se nell'antica economia tale luogo era il tempio di Gerusalemme, ora è Gesù, dimora del Dio invisibile."³
