THE SOLEMNITY OF OUR LORD JESUS CHRIST, KING OF THE UNIVERSE ~ NOVEMBER 23, 2025



Dear Friends in Christ, the Catholic Church often proclaims Jubilee Years as privileged moments of renewal, conversion, and rediscovery of God's mercy. As we celebrate this final Sunday of the liturgical year - Christ the King - I wish to reflect on the Jubilee of Hope inaugurated by Pope Francis at the end of 2024 and the last

ordinary Jubilee held exactly one century earlier, in 1925, under Pope Pius XI. Though separated by one hundred years, these two Holy Years offer a powerful and unified message for our time.

In 1925, Pope Pius XI proclaimed a Jubilee during a period marked by deep global unrest. The world was still healing from the devastation of World War I. New political ideologies were rising, and many people felt disillusioned, unsure whether faith still had relevance in the modern world. In response to this cultural and spiritual crisis, Pius XI issued his encyclical *Quas Primas* (December 11, 1925), in which he instituted the Feast of Christ the King. Pius XI's hope was that the new solemnity would serve as a beacon of light for a world drifting into darkness. He wrote with urgency and conviction, "We firmly hope...that the Feast of the Kingship of Christ...may hasten the return of society to our loving Savior." The pope insisted that Catholics had a responsibility to work for this renewal.

Through the Holy Year of 1925, Pius XI sought to restore clarity and confidence to a world shaken by confusion. He proclaimed that Christ, not earthly powers, is the true ruler of history; that Christ, not political systems, is the foundation of peace; and that Christ, not human achievement, is the world's enduring hope. His message was bold: only when humanity returns to Christ the King can justice, peace, and dignity be restored.

A century later, the Church finds itself again proclaiming a Jubilee in an age of anxiety. When Pope Francis opened the Holy Door of St. Peter's Basilica on 24 December 2024, he inaugurated the Jubilee of Hope for 2025 - another Holy Year born from a world burdened by conflict, division, and uncertainty. Just as Pius XI saw the world of his time searching for direction, Pope Francis saw the world of our modern time searching for hope.

Francis has said that the primary purpose of the 2025 Jubilee is "to rekindle hope, because every person needs hope in life." His emphasis was not simply on optimism or positive thinking but on the Christian virtue of hope: a confidence rooted in the Risen Christ who walks with His people. While Pius XI highlighted Christ's sovereignty over the nations, Francis emphasized the tenderness Christ has for the weary, the wounded, and the discouraged. Yet their messages converge. If Christ is truly King, then no fear, sin, or suffering is beyond His authority. If Christ truly walks with His people, then hope is possible even in the most painful circumstances. We can live with unshakeable hope because Christ is both Lord of history and our companion as we walk in this valley of tears.

As we come to the end of the Church's liturgical year, our attention naturally turns to the great final realities: the Second Coming of Christ, the Last Judgment, and the fulfillment of all creation. While many today look at these themes with great fear and trepidation, nevertheless, they echo the same truth proclaimed in both the 1925 and 2025 Jubilees: history is not a meaningless cycle of chaos, but continually moves toward Christ, who is the Alpha and the Omega, the beginning and the end.

The Feast of Christ the King - established by Pius XI and now firmly set as the final Sunday of every liturgical year - proclaims that Jesus will bring all creation to its completion. It reminds us that every Christian is called to live in joyful expectation of His return. As we celebrate this feast, it is good to ask ourselves: Where do I place my hope? What truly endures? Do I live as if Christ is truly my King? Am I preparing my heart to meet Him with joy?

These questions also prepare us for Advent - the season that begins next week - a time of waiting, longing, and hope. As we enter a new liturgical year, may we allow Christ the King to reign more fully in our hearts and renew within us the unshakable hope that comes only from Him.

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"Viva Cristo Rey!"

in 1925 and, later, after the Second Vatican Council, it was placed at the close of the liturgical year. The Gospel according to Saint Luke presents, as in a great painting, the kingship of Jesus at the moment of his crucifixion. The leaders of the people and the soldiers taunt 'the firstborn of all creation' and put him to the test to see whether he has the power to save himself from death. Yet precisely on the cross, Jesus is exalted to the very

'height' of the God who is love. It is there that he can be 'known.' Jesus gives us life because he gives us God. He can give God because he himself is one with God. From the One who 'is before all things, and in him all things hold together,' the so-called 'Good Thief' straightaway receives forgiveness and the joy of entering the kingdom of heaven.... Jesus, from the throne of the cross, welcomes every human being with infinite mercy" (Pope Benedict XVI).¹

Ora, sull'albero della croce, Cristo gli inferisce un colpo mortale e salva l'uomo. Gesù poteva scendere dalla croce e salvarsi; ma non l'ha fatto, perché altrimenti non ci avrebbe salvato. Ed ecco che raccoglie i frutti della sua passione: uno dei due ladroni crocifissi ai suoi fianchi confessa i propri peccati ed esorta l'altro a fare lo stesso, ma, soprattutto, professa la sua fede: Gesù è Re! Il Re crocifisso gli assicura in modo solenne: "Oggi sarai con me in paradiso". Adamo aveva chiuso a tutti le porte del paradiso, Gesù, vincitore del peccato, della morte e di Satana, apre le porte del paradiso anche ai più grandi peccatori, purché si convertano, sia pure nel momento della loro morte. Del resto, noi ben conosciamo molte conversioni simili.3

ASK A PRIEST Is It OK to Ask God for Something Specific?

Q: In the Surrender Novena, we are to surrender ourselves to Jesus and let him take care of everything? I have the impression that we are not supposed to ask for specific help with an issue or problem we may be facing. On the other hand, there are many novenas along with verses in the Bible (like Mark 11:24) and Matthew where Jesus says to ask for what you need in prayer and believe to receive. How would one use the Surrender Novena if there is a specific need in which one is seeking God's help on? Thank you. — Claudio

Answered by Fr. Edward McIlmail, LC:

I don't think this is a case of "either-or" — either you make a general act of surrender to God or you ask for something specific. You can do both: ask for something specific from God as well as make a general act of surrender to his will. Sometimes God will answer our prayers, not by giving us what we want but by giving us what we most need. In this sense we can imitate Jesus in the Garden of Gethsemane, who prayed, "Father, if you are willing, take this cup away from me; still, not my will but yours be done" (Luke 22:42). Jesus at a human level didn't want the cross, but he was willing to accept it as his Father's will. This is where he surrendered himself to the Father ... which is what we should do, too.
